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Executive Summary

The 2019 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Occupational/Career Information unit of the Labor Market Information Section to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Development Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2014 to 2018, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2018 to 2020.

Arkansas increased in population in 2018 by 10,828 from 2017; and adding a total of 46,099 new residents from 2014 to 2018. Of Arkansas's 10 Local Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), Northwest Arkansas continues to see the largest increase in population, adding 36,160 in 2018. The Eastern, North Central, Southeast, and Southwest Arkansas LWDAs continued to see decreasing populations in 2018.

Between 2017 and 2018 the state's labor force decreased by 2,769 and employment decreased by 2,975. Labor force and employment were mixed across the LWDAs. The State's unemployment rate remained at 3.7 percent in 2018, but that is a drop of two and three-tenths percentage points since 2014. The unemployment rate dropped in 2018, ending the month of July at 3.4 percent. The unemployment rate decreased across all LWDAs in 2018 and through July 2019. The Northwest Arkansas LWDA unemployment rate fell below state levels through July 2019.

Short-term employment projections for 2018 to 2020 continue to see an increase in the Arkansas job market with 38,742 jobs, equivalent to a 2.75 percent rise in employment. Goods-Producing Industries are estimated to see a net gain of 9,066 jobs, while the Services-Providing Industries are forecast to increase employment by 26,480. Arkansas's self-employed ranks are estimated to experience a net gain of 2,823, an increase of 2.25 percent.

Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are estimated to add more jobs than any other education

level with 15,511 jobs between 2018 and 2020. Occupations requiring a Bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 7,851.

Arkansas' per capita personal income increased over the 2013-2017 period to \$41,046; however, the state's per capita personal income in 2017 remained below the United States' per capita personal income of \$51,640. During the first quarter of 2019, the cost of living composite index in Arkansas' urban areas was below the national average for all urban areas in the index.

More than 965,000 Arkansas workers earned at least \$10 or more an hour in 2018, with the mean annual wage for all employer sizes estimated at \$41,540 in 2018. Of the six states surrounding Arkansas, only Mississippi had a lower overall average hourly and average annual wage for all occupations. Of the surrounding states, Texas had the highest average annual wage that was almost 17 percent higher than the average annual wage for Arkansas.

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State of Arkansas

The state of Arkansas' population grew to 3,013,825 in 2018, adding 10,828 from 2017 to 2018 and 46,099 from 2014 to 2018. The State of Arkansas consists of 10 Workforce Development Areas (LW-DAs), six Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), and 75 counties. Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas border the state.


State of Arkansas Population 2014-2018




State Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The labor force decreased by 2,769 between 2017 and 2018 and employment decreased by 2,975 over the same period. Unemployment increased by 206 from 2017 to 2018, but has seen a decrease of 29,242 since 2014. The state's unemployment rate remained unchanged from 2017 to 2018. Over the 2014–2018 period, the unemployment rate dropped 2.3 percentage points to 3.7 percent for 2018. The state's unemployment rate was 3.4 percent in July 2019.



ABOUT THE INDEX: C2ER produces the Cost of Living Index to provide a useful and reasonably accurate measure of living cost differences among urban areas. Items on which the Index is based have been carefully chosen to reflect the different categories of consumer expenditures. Weights assigned to relative costs are based on government survey data on expenditure patterns for professional and executive households. All items are priced in each place at a specified time and according to standardized specifications.

INTERPRETING THE INDEX: The Cost of Living Index measures relative price levels for consumer goods and services in participating areas. The average for all participating places, both metropolitan and nonmetropolitan, equals 100, and each participant's index is read as a percentage of the average for all places.

The Index does not measure inflation (price change over time). Because each quarterly report is a separate comparison of prices at a single point in time, and because both the number and the mix of participants changes from one quarter to the next, Index data from different quarters cannot be compared. State Median Household/ Per Capita Personal Income


Arkansas' median household income was \$43,813 in 2017 which increased by \$1,477 from 2016 to 2017 but is below the national median household income of \$57,652 for 2017. Arkansas' per capita personal income in 2017 was \$41,046, an increase of \$1,300 from 2016. Over the 2013-2017 period, the per capita personal income increased by \$5,051. The state's per capita personal income is below the United States per capita personal income of \$51,640.

Arkansas/United States Median Household Income 2013-2017



State Employment

In 2018, whites made up 78.7 percent of the labor force while the total of all minority groups made up 21.3 percent of the labor force. The unemployment rate for all races, including Hispanics, was 6.3 percent. The unemployment rate for all minority groups combined was 7.4 percent. Hispanics of all races made up 6.9 percent of the labor force, with an unemployment rate of 5.1 percent.

State Education

Every education category is projected to see positive net growth between 2018 and 2020. Occupations requiring no formal education are projected to add 9,287 jobs during the projection period. Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are expected to add 15,511 jobs during the projection period and had the highest educational attainment between 2013 and 2017 at 34.3 percent. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 7,851 jobs and 14.1 percent of the population 25 years and over had a bachelor's degree in 2017. Growth in occupations requiring a master's degree or doctoral or professional degree is expected to be 834 and 984 jobs respectively. Educational attainment of the state's population aged 25 years and over shows that 85.6 percent have earned at least a high school diploma or equivalent, up 0.4 percent from 2016.



Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers was estimated to have the most employees across the state with 60,956 employed in 2018 with an average wage of \$67,520. Retail Salespersons was the second largest occupation with 39,975 employed, earning an average wage of \$25,610. General and Operations Managers, with an estimated employment of 22,768, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$87,650 annually.

Surgeons topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$266,630.

Anesthesiologists, with an

average annual salary of \$229,760, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.



The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$20,710 for 2018. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$33,526, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$51,950 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 1,210,120 estimated employees, 244,226 made less than \$10 an hour while 268,242 made more than \$25 an hour. Employees making between \$15 and \$19.99 totaled 217,753.







Average Annual Wages for Surrounding States





State Industry

Between the first quarter of 2017 and the first quarter of 2018, the Arkansas economy saw an increase of just 11,251 jobs, which translates to a 0.94 percent increase. The job market is expected to continue this growth with an increase of 38,742 jobs, equivalent to a 2.75 percent rise in employment by 2020. **Insurance Carriers** is predicted to be the top growing industry adding 2,694 new jobs, going from 16,283 jobs in 2018 to 18,977 in 2020. **Nonscheduled Air Transportation** is projected to raise employment levels by 22.33 percent, becoming the fastest growing industry in the state by bringing employment to 126. **Food and Beverage Stores** is estimated to be the top declining industry with a loss of 459 jobs bringing its employment from 19,463 in 2018 down to 19,004 in 2020. An increase in scan-and-go as well as grocery pickup programs may be to blame for the decline. **Lessors of Nonfinancial Intangible Assets (except Copyrighted Works)** is predicted to be the fastest declining industry with a loss of 47.06 percent of its workforce. **Education and Health Services** is expected to remain the top growing supersector in Arkansas, adding 7,576 jobs bringing employment levels to 312,917 by March 2020.

State Occupations

The Arkansas labor market is expected to see a growth of 38,742 jobs over the 2018-2020 projection period, an increase of 2.75 percent, with many job opportunities for recent graduates and other job seekers. There is expected to be 172,961 total annual job openings during the projection period with 66,790 openings available due to employees exiting the workforce. Another 86,800 are estimated to be available due to employees changing jobs, while 19,371 would be due to the growth and decline of an occupation. All major occupational groups are estimated to see net gains in employment. **Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food** is forecast to remain the top growing occupation with a gain of 1,553 jobs raising employment to 36,026. **Hoist and Winch Operators** is forecast to increase employment by 13.70 percent becoming the fastest growing occupation in the state. **Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers** is predicted to lead the state in the number of annual job exits with 3,593, while **Cashiers** is slated to see the most job transfers with 3,467. Overall, **Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food** is projected to experience the most annual job openings with 7,162 each year between 2018 and 2020. Cashiers is also projected to be the top declining occupation losing 373 jobs due to several closures among major retailers, bringing employment from 38,022 in 2018 to 37,649 in 2020. **Gas Plant Operators** is expected to be the fastest declining occupation with a loss of 14.81 percent bringing employment down to 207 statewide. The **Production Occupations** major group is estimated to lead the state in numeric change adding 4,037 new jobs to its workforce increasing employment to 121,211 by 2020.



State Covered Employment and Earnings

According to the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages Report, Arkansas' covered employment grew 0.90 percent from 2017 to 2018. This translates to 10,605 jobs added to the workforce. Of all the major North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) industry supersector groups, four lost jobs during the reference period. **Information** lost the most at 1,860 jobs, also having the fastest decline, losing 14.57 percent of its workforce. Of the eight growing industry groups, Manufacturing grew the most, adding 3,274 jobs. Manufacturing and Financial Activities tied for the fastest growing industries at 2.08 percent.

Overall, average weekly earnings in 2018 for the state was \$836.46. The average weekly earnings range from a low of \$317.89 in **Leisure and Hospitality** to a high of \$1,159.85 in **Professional and Business Services**.






Central Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The LWDA saw an increase in the labor force of 290 to 251,133 from 2017 to 2018 and the labor force increased by 8,150 over the 2014 to 2018 period. Employment increased by 290 between 2017 and 2018 and increased by 12,782 over the five-year period. The LWDA has seen a decrease in unemployment over the same time periods. From 2017 to 2018, the numbers in unemployment stayed the same, but from 2014 to 2018, unemployment decreased by 4,632. The LWDA's unemployment rate remained the same between 2017 and 2018, but the unemployment rate decreased by two percentage points over the five-year period. In 2019, the unemployment rate decreased by three-tenths of a percentage point from January to 3.6 percent in July 2019.



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



Central Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The area is expected to add 4,175 new jobs, an increase of 2.33 percent. *Food Services and Drinking Places* is estimated to be the top growing industry with an increase of 526 new jobs bringing employment to 16,532. *Private Households* is expected to experience significant growth becoming the fastest growing industry with a gain of 50.47 percent, or 638 new jobs. On the negative side of the labor market, *Administrative and Support Services* is forecast to be the top declining industry, losing 223 jobs between 2018 and 2020, moving employment down to 6,873. *Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers* is slated to be the fastest declining industry with a 24.56 percent drop in employment moving employment from 452 in 2018 to 341 in 2020. **Education and Health Services** is expected to be the top growing supersector adding 1,006 jobs during the projection period, increasing employment to 36,930.

The Central Arkansas LWDA is expected to have 22,065 annual job openings during the projection period, with 8,748 being created due to employees exiting the workforce, 11,229 created due to employees changing jobs, and 2,088 due to growth and expansion. *Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food* is projected to be the top growing occupation in the area as well as have the most annual openings with a gain of 304 jobs and 1,398 annual job openings. *Insurance Claims and Policy Processing Clerks* is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, adding 16.29 percent to its workforce, bringing its employment to 207. *Cashiers* is estimated to lose 47 jobs during the projection period, making it the top declining occupation in the Area, moving employment to 6,773 in 2020. *Grinding and Polishing Workers, Hand* is slated to be the fastest declining occupation, losing 7.06 percent of its workforce bringing employment down to 79. **Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations** is projected to be the top growing major group with an increase of 542 jobs, bringing total employment to 17,259.









The labor force increased in the LWDA by 384 from 2017 to 2018, and saw an increase of 2,590 between 2014 and 2018. Employment increased by 226 from 2017 to 2018 and by 4,354 from 2014 to 2018. Unemployment and the unemployment rate increased between 2017 to 2018, with unemployment increasing by 158 and the unemployment rate increasing by two-tenths of a percentage point to 3.5 percent in 2018. The unemployment rate decreased by one and nine-tenths percentage points from 2014 to 2018. The area unemployment rate dropped from January 2019 through July 2019, decreasing by three-tenths of a percentage point to 3.7 percent in July 2019.



Registered Nurses was estimated to have the most employees in Little Rock with 9,010 employed in 2018 with an average wage of \$65,883. **Retail**

Salespersons is the second largest occupation with 7,930 employed, earning an average wage of \$26,071. **General and Operations**

Managers, with an estimated employment of 5,180, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$94,499 annually.

Family and General Practitioners topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$243,486. **Psychiatrists**, with an average annual salary of \$238,465, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$22,076 for 2018. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$33,686, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$58,929 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 262,383 estimated employees in the area, 77,365 made more than \$25 an hour while 41,707 made less than \$10 an hour. Employees making between \$15 and \$19.99 totaled 47,172. *Note: Wage data for the City of Little Rock LWDA includes all of Pulaski County.*

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



City of Little Rock Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The City of Little Rock LWDA is expected to grow by 5,732 jobs between 2018 and 2020, or an increase of 2.82 percent. *Administrative and Support Services* is predicted to be the top growing industry adding 1,329 new jobs to its workforce bringing employment to 13,138. *Crop Production* is predicted to be the fastest growing industry with a 47.06 percent gain, moving employment to 50. *Data Processing, Hosting and Related Services* is slated to lose more than 57.30 percent of its workforce due in part to business relocations, making it the fastest declining industry in the area moving employment below 100. *Educational Services* is forecast to be the top declining industry, losing 257 jobs, or 2.22 percent of its workforce, moving employment from 11,579 in 2018 to 11,322 in 2020. *Sporting Goods, Hobby, Book, and Music Stores* is estimated to be the fastest declining industry, cutting 20.27 percent of its workforce. **Professional and Business Services** is estimated to be the top growing supersector in the City of Little Rock LWDA, adding an anticipated 1,781 new jobs, an increase of 6.63 percent, bringing its employment to 28,664.

Area employers are expected to have 24,036 annual openings during the projection period. Of these, 9,104 would be created due to employees leaving the workforce, while 12,066 would be created due to employees changing jobs. Another 2,866 would be related to growth and expansion. *Customer Service Representatives* is slated to be the top growing occupation with an anticipated gain of 279 new jobs, bringing its employment to 4,848. *Hazardous Materials Removal Workers* could be the fastest growing occupation, raising employment by 21.88 percent going from 64 jobs in 2018 to 78 jobs in 2020. *Cashiers* is expected to fall in employment dropping by 95 jobs, making it the top declining industry and moving employment down to 3,913. *Switchboard Operators, Including Answering Service* could see a 3.65 percent reduction in its workforce to a level of 185, making it the fastest declining occupation. **Office and Administrative Support Occupations** is predicted to be the top growing major group adding 789 new jobs to its workforce bringing its employment level to 34,977.






Eastern Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The labor force in the Eastern Arkansas LWDA decreased by 160 to 46,754 in 2018 from 2017, and has decreased by 2,231 from 2014 to 2018. Employment decreased from 2017 to 2018, losing 189 workers to 44,542. Unemployment saw a slight increase from 2017 to 2018, having 29 more unemployed, but that wasn't enough to change the unemployment rate dropping from 4.7 percent. Since the beginning of 2019, the unemployment rate fluctuated from 5.7 percent in January to 3.8 percent in April, ending July 2019 at 5.2 percent.

Fastern Arkansas and State Unemployment Rate*




Eastern Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Wages

Cashiers was estimated to have the most employees in Eastern Arkansas with 1,580 employed in 2018 with an average wage of \$19,861. Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food was the second largest occupation with 1,390 employed, earning an average wage of \$19,314. Correc-



tional Officers and Jailers, with an estimated employment of 610, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$41,664 annually.

Family and General Practitioners topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$189,410. **Dentists, General**, with an average annual salary of \$148,014, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$19,636 for 2018. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$30,101, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$43,855 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 35,232 estimated employees in the area, 10,253 made less than \$10 an hour while 6,118 made \$15 to \$19.99 an hour. Employees making more than \$25 an hour totaled 5,847.





Eastern Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The Eastern Arkansas LWDA is expected to experience a mixed outlook with a net gain of only 19 jobs between 2018 and 2020. *Ambulatory Health Care Services* is projected to be the top growing industry increasing employment by 102 jobs bringing its employment level to 2,082. *Insurance Carriers and Related Activities* is estimated to grow by 14.04 percent making it the fastest growing industry moving employment from 228 in 2018 to 260 in 2020. As population declines, so does school enrollment, which could be a contributing factor in *Educational Services* being the top declining industry. The industry is projected to lose 178 jobs during the projection period driving employment down to 4,319. *Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers* is slated to cut more than a third of its workforce from 2018 and 2020. **Leisure and Hospitality** is anticipated to be the top growing supersector with a gain of 114 jobs to an employment level of 3,852.

Eastern Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Occupations

The Eastern Arkansas LWDA is expected to have 4,700 annual job openings during the projection period, with 2,101 being created due to employees leaving the workforce and 2,589 due to those changing jobs. Job opportunities related to growth and expansion add 10 jobs annually. *Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food* is predicted to be the top growing occupation with 47 new jobs bringing employment level to 1,479. At 13.21 percent, *Insurance Sales Agents* is set to be the fastest growing occupation in the area driving employment to 60. On the flip side of the economy, *Cashiers* is projected to be the top declining occupation with a loss of 47 bringing job levels down to 1,945. *Extruding and Drawing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic* is projected to be the fastest declining occupation, losing 69.70 percent of its workforce. **Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations** is projected to be the top growing major group with a net gain of 76 jobs between 2018 and 2020, bringing its employment level up to 3,308.









North Central Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The North Central Arkansas LWDA is projected to add 1,819 jobs from first quarter 2018 through first quarter 2020, or increase employment by 2.15 percent, which is slower than the state growth rate. *Crop Production* is forecast to be the top growing industry with a gain of 267 new jobs bringing its total workforce to 1,203. *Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers* is expected to be the fastest growing industry increasing employment by 56.63 percent going from 83 jobs in 2018 to 130 in 2020. *Educational Services* is predicted to be the top declining industry with a loss of 194 jobs, dropping employment to 8,693. *Electronics and Appliance Stores* is predicted to lose 30.43 percent of its workforce making it the fastest declining industry dropping employment below 100 in the area. **Manufacturing** is projected to be the top growing supersector with 485 new jobs increasing employment to 8,918.

The area is expected to have 9,950 total job openings annually between 2018 and 2020. Of these, 4,110 would be from those exiting the workforce, while 4,930 would be from those changing jobs. Another 910 would be related to growth and expansion. *Personal Care Aides* is anticipated to gain 96 jobs between 2018 and 2020 making it the top growing occupation in the area bringing employment to 1,266. *Extruding, Forming, Pressing, and Compacting Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders* is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation raising employment by 19.23 percent, moving employment from 26 in 2018 to 31 in 2020. *Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers* could lose 76 jobs, or 3.71 percent of its workforce, making it the top declining occupation, bringing employment down to 1,972. *Sawing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Wood* is expected to lose 12.22 percent of its workforce, making it the fastest declining occupation. **Production Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing occupational group adding 334 new jobs bringing its employment level to 6,949.





State of Arkansas Population 2014-2018







Northeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The Northeast Arkansas LWDA is expected to add 4,243 jobs during the projection period, a 3.62 percent rise in employment, which is faster than the state growth rate. *Animal Production* may ramp up employment in the area with an anticipated increase of 63.70 percent, or 479 new jobs, moving employment above the 1,200 mark, making it the top and fastest growing industry. *Support Activities for Agriculture and Forestry* is one of two industries leading the area in loss of jobs, with an anticipated drop of 98 jobs during the projection period. *Furniture and Related Product Manufacturing* is the other industry expected to lose 98 jobs, but be the fastest declining industry, losing 38.28 percent of its workforce. **Manufacturing** is expected to be the top growing supersector with an increase of 980, or a 4.64 percent increase in employment to a level of 22,090.

Northeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Occupations

The Northeast Arkansas LWDA is expected to have 15,083 annual openings during the projection period with 5,634 created due to employees leaving the workforce, 7,327 from those changing jobs, and 2,122 due to growth and expansion. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers is anticipated to be the top growing occupation with a gain of 349 jobs, raising its employment to 6,374. Farmworkers, Farm, Ranch, and Aquacultural Animals is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation, raising employment by 51.83 percent to a level of 665. Maids and Housekeeping Cleaners is projected to be the top declining occupation losing 10 jobs, bringing employment down to 658. Respiratory Therapy Technicians is projected to be the fastest declining occupation, losing 9.86 percent of its workforce. **Production Occupations** is anticipated to add the most new jobs among the major occupational groups in Northeast Arkansas, adding 619 to the local workforce, increasing employment to 15,895.



Northwest Arkansas LWDA Population 2014-2018 Northwest Arkansas Population Progression







The Northwest Arkansas LWDA labor force and employment both increased from 2017 to 2018, with the labor force gaining 3,483 to 322,131 and employment increasing by 3,501 to 312,701. Unemployment decreased by 18 to 9,430 in 2018, and has seen a decline of 4,462 since 2014. The unemployment rate dropped from 2017 to 2018 by one-tenth of a percentage point to 2.9 percent. The area's unemployment rate decreased by a total of one and nine-tenths percentage points from 2014. The unemployment rate ended July 2019 at 2.9 percent.





The Northwest Arkansas LWDA has the largest employment base in the state and is predicted to be the top growing area in the state, which provides job seekers with a variety of career choices among the many industries and occupations. This area is projected to gain 12,611 jobs, an increase of 3.96 percent between 2018 and 2020 and one of three areas growing faster than the state as a whole. *Food Manufacturing* is expected to lead the area, with 861 new jobs, bringing employment to 17,604. *Support Activities for Agriculture and Forestry* is predicted to increase by 19.68 percent, making it the fastest growing industry in the area moving employment to 669. *Private Households* is anticipated to be the top and fastest declining industry, cutting 111 jobs, or 14.55 percent of its workforce. **Education and Health Services** is predicted to be the top growing supersector adding 2,327 new jobs increasing its workforce to 63,883.

Northwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Occupations

The Northwest Arkansas LWDA is projected to have 41,353 annual job openings of which 15,066 would be created from employees leaving the workforce, 19,981 from those changing jobs, and 6,306 from growth and expansion. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is estimated to drive growth adding 618 new jobs, making it the top growing occupation in Northwest Arkansas increasing employment to 12,343. Insurance Claims and Policy Processing Clerks is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation raising employment 15.54 percent to a level of 513. Telecommunications Equipment Installers and Repairers, Except Line Installers is anticipated to be the top declining occupation, losing seven jobs, an amount equivalent to 1.85 percent of its workforce. Reporters and Correspondents is forecast to be the fastest declining occupation, losing six percent of its respective workforce. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is expected to be the top growing major group with an increase of 1,412 new jobs moving employment from 27,447 in 2018 to 28,859 in 2020.





State of Arkansas Population 2014-2018




Southeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

Southeast Arkansas saw a slight increase in the labor force of 47 to 81,385 from 2017 to 2018, and employment increased by 73 to 77,550 for the same time period. Both the labor force and employment have decreased since 2014 by 3,486 and 604 respectively. Unemployment decreased by 26 to 3,835 from 2017 to 2018 and the unemployment rate remained at 4.7 percent in 2018. After climbing to 5.9 percent in January 2019, the unemployment rate fell seven-tenths of a percentage point to settle at 5.2 percent in July 2019.

Southeast Arkansas and State Unemployment Rate*



Southeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Wages

Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food was estimated to have the most employees in Southeast Arkansas with 2,480 employed in 2018 with an average wage of \$19,942. Cashiers was the second largest occupation with 1,950 employed, earning an average wage of \$20,063. Registered Nurses, with an estimated employment of 1,160, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$59,048 annually.

Family and General Practitioners topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$202,899. **Physicians and Surgeons, All Other**, with an average annual salary of \$194,820, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$20,357 for 2018. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$32,625, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$46,630 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 68,859 estimated employees in the area, 15,771 made less than \$10 an hour while 13,323 made \$15 to \$19.99 an hour. Employees making more than \$25 an hour totaled 12,573.





Southeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The Southeast Arkansas LWDA is expected to gain 734 new jobs between 2018 and 2020. *Food Manufacturing* is predicted to be the top growing industry, adding 194 new jobs to its workforce, bringing its employment to 3,960. *Amusement, Gambling, and Recreation Industries* could raise employment by 26.14 percent to an employment level of 193. On the negative side of the local labor market, *Educational Services* is anticipated to lose 220 jobs, becoming the top declining industry, moving employment from 8,193 in 2018 to 7,973 in 2020. *Printing and Related Support Activities* is estimated to be the fastest declining industry with a loss of 30 percent of its workforce, driving employment down to 14. **Manufacturing** is projected to be the top growing supersector with a gain of 474 new jobs between 2018 and 2020, bringing its job level up to 15,030.

Southeast Arkansas LWDA employment is expected to increase by just 0.89 percent between 2018 and 2020. There are 9,265 job openings projected to be available annually during the projection period. Of these, 3,894 would be from employees leaving the workforce, while 5,004 could be created from those changing jobs. Another 367 jobs would be connected to growth and expansion. *Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food*, which is estimated to be the top growing occupation adding 47 new jobs to an employment level of 1,479. At 13.21 percent, *Insurance Sales Agents* is anticipated to be the fastest growing occupation in the area, bringing employment up to 60. On the negative side of the local economy, *Cashiers* is projected to be the top declining occupation, with a loss of 47 jobs, moving employment down to 1,945. *Extruding and Drawing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic* is expected to lose 69.70 percent of its workforce during the projection period, moving employment from 33 in 2018 to near single-digits in 2020. **Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations** is projected to be the top growing major group, gaining 76 jobs during the projection period, a 2.35 percent rise in employment, bringing its employment to 3,308.





State of Arkansas Population 2014-2018




Southwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The Southwest Arkansas LWDA labor force decreased from 2017 to 2018 by 147 to 92,615, while employment decreased by 313 to 88,314. Over the five-year period from 2014 to 2018, the area has seen a decrease of 1,873 in the labor force and an increase of 221 in employment. Unemployment increased by 166 from 2017 to 2018, but decreased by 2,094 over the five-year period. The unemployment rate rose by one-tenth of a percentage point from 2017 to 2018 to 4.6 percent. After various fluctuations in the unemployment rate during 2019, the rate settled back to 5.0 percent in July 2019.

Southwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Wages

Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was estimated to have the most employees in Southwest Arkansas with 2,940 employed in 2018 with an average wage of \$38,426. Retail Salespersons was the second largest occupation with 2,390 employed, earning an average wage of \$23,321. Heavy and



Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations.

Family and General Practitioners topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$206,112. **Physicians and Surgeons, All Other**, with an average annual salary of \$178,210, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$20,294 for 2018. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$35,814, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$46,737 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 78,777 estimated employees in the area, 18,430 made less than \$10 an hour while 14,626 made more than \$25 an hour. Employees making between \$15 and \$19.99 totaled 13,951.





Southwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Employment in the Southwest Arkansas LWDA is projected to increase by 1,057 jobs, a 1.15 percent growth rate over the 2018-2020 projection period. *Food Manufacturing* is estimated to be the top growing industry, adding 244 jobs during the projection period, bringing employment to 4,973. *Mining (except Oil and Gas)* is slated to be the fastest growing industry with an anticipated increase of 11.69 percent, moving employment from 154 in 2018 to 172 in 2020. *Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations* is projected to lose 132 jobs, making it the top declining industry, as a decline in church employment has been seen over the last few years. *Primary Metal Manufacturing* is slated to cut 23.64 percent of its workforce, dropping employment to 168. **Education and Health Services** is estimated to be the top growing supersector with 415 new jobs moving its employment to 19,252.

Between 2018 and 2020, Southwest Arkansas LWDA employers are estimated to have 10,460 job openings annually. The area is forecast to have 4,340 annual openings due to employees leaving the workforce and 5,592 due to those changing jobs. Growth and expansion could account for an additional 528 annual. *Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food* is predicted to add 87 to the labor market between 2018 and 2020, bringing its employment to 2,466. *Telecommunications Equipment Installers and Repairers, Except Line Installers* is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing employment by 9.84 percent to a job level of 67. *Cashiers* is slated to be the top declining occupation with a loss of 118 jobs, dropping employment to 2,739, but *Cutting, Punching, and Press Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic* is expected to be the fastest declining occupation with a 20 percent drop in its workforce moving its employment level below 25. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is projected to be the top growing major group, adding 183 new jobs, moving its employment to 8,287.







In 2018, the labor force and employment increased in the West Central Arkansas LWDA. The labor force increased by 253 to a total of 132,055, while employment increased 232 to a total of 126,527. Despite the recent increase, the labor force decreased by 1,102 from 2014 to 2018 while employment increased by 1,933. Unemployment increased from 2017 to 2018 by 21 to 5,528. This was not enough of a change to move the unemployment rate from 4.2 percent. The unemployment rate fluctuated through 2019, but settled to 4.7 percent by July 2019.

West Central Arkansas and State Unemployment Rate*



Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food was estimated to have the most employees in West Central Arkansas with 3,730 employed in 2018 with an average wage of \$19,633. Retail Salespersons was the second largest occupation with 3,460 employed, earning an average wage of \$25,469. Registered Nurses, with an estimated employment of 2,020, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$57,667 annually.

Internists, General topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$242,451. **Family and General Practitioners**, with an average annual salary of \$235,047, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.



The entry wage estimate for employers

of all sizes was \$20,251 for 2018. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$30,656, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$44,975 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 106,503 estimated employees in the area, 25,923 made less than \$10 an hour while 16,526 made more than \$25 an hour. Employees making between \$15 and \$19.99 totaled 19,574.





West Central Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The West Central Arkansas LWDA is expected to see a growth of 3,416 jobs by the first quarter of 2020. *Educational Services* is predicted to be the top growing industry with an increase of 568 jobs between 2018 and 2020, bringing employment to 12,681. *Transit and Ground Passenger Transportation* is slated to gain 17.14 percent, making it the fastest growing industry in the Area, moving employment to 164 employees. On the negative side of the local economy, *Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing* is forecast to lose 125 jobs, or 38.46 percent of its workforce, making the industry the top and fastest declining industry. **Education and Health Services** is predicted to be the top growing supersector adding 1,229 new jobs, increasing employment to 30,266.

The area's employment is expected to increase by 2.67 percent during the projection period. An estimated 16,086 annual job openings are anticipated in this area. Of these, 6,378 openings could be due to those exiting the workforce, while 8,000 could come from those changing jobs. Growth and expansion is estimated to account for 1,708 of those jobs. *Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food* is estimated to be the top growing occupation with a gain of 177, moving employment to 4,049. *Paper Goods Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders* could be the fastest growing occupation, raising employment by 51.72 percent, moving its ranks to 176 in the area. On the flip side of the job market, *Cashiers* is forecast to be the top declining occupation, losing 66 jobs during the projection period, dropping employment to 4,377, while *Electrical and Electronic Equipment Assemblers* could lose 40.24 percent of its workforce, dropping its employment below 50. **Transportation and Material Occupations** is projected to be the top growing major group, adding 454 new jobs between 2018 and 2020, bringing employment up to 10,523.









Western Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Wages

Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food was estimated to have the most employees in Western Arkansas with 4,120 employed in 2018 with an average wage of \$19,690. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was the second largest occupation with 3,580 employed, earning an average wage of \$36,944. Registered Nurses, with an estimated employment of 2,400, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$57,714 annually.

Family and General Practitioners topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$261,005. **Marketing Managers**, with an average annual salary of \$151,302, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$20,662 for 2018. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$32,033, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$48,068 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 107,248 estimated employees in the area, 21,936 made less than \$10 an hour while 19,822 made more than \$25 an hour. Employees making between \$15 and \$19.99 an hour totaled 18,726.

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



Western Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

The Western Arkansas LWDA is expected to experience a net gain of 2,696 jobs during the projection period. Administrative and Support Services is predicted to be the top growing industry gaining 407 jobs between 2018 and 2020 moving from 6,395 employees in 2018 to 6,802 in 2020. Support Activities for Agriculture and Forestry could see a 59.31 percent rise in employment making it the fastest growing industry, moving employment to 599. Hospitals is predicted to lose 233 jobs, making it the top declining industry, moving employment down to 4,069, while Mining (Except Oil and Gas) is projected to be the fastest declining industry, with a loss of more than a quarter of its workforce, dropping employment to 119. **Professional and Business**Services is predicted to be the top growing supersector increasing employment by 501 jobs to an employment of 11,045.

Western Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Occupations

Western Arkansas LWDA is projected to have a net job gain of 2.22 percent between 2018 and 2020. Around 14,820 annual job openings are expected to be available during the projection period, with 5,872 from occupational exits, 7,600 from occupational transfers, and 1,348 from growth and expansion. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is projected to add 261 new jobs and be the top growing occupation in the area bringing employment to 4,149. Animal Trainers could be the fastest growing occupation, raising employment by 26.67 percent to a level of 95. On the negative side of the economy, Farmworkers, Farm, Ranch, and Aquacultural Animals could lose 44 jobs between 2018 and 2020, making it the top declining occupation, moving employment down to 680. Tool and Die Makers, however, could lose 13.19 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation, and moving employment down to 250. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** leads the area as the top growing occupational major group with an estimated 549 new jobs, increasing employment to 11,824.


