









2020 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report

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Executive Summary

The 2020 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Occupational/Career Information unit of the Labor Market Information section to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Development Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2015 to 2019, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2019 to 2021.

Arkansas increased in population in 2019 by 3,979 from 2018; and added a total of 39,397 new residents from 2015 to 2019. Of Arkansas's 10 Local Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), Central Arkansas saw the largest increase in population, adding 1,458 in 2019. The Little Rock, Eastern, Northwest, Southeast, Southwest, and Western Arkansas LWDAs saw decreasing populations in 2019.

Between 2018 and 2019 the state's labor force increased by 11,146 and employment increased by 12,831. Labor force and employment were mixed across the LWDAs. The state's unemployment rate dropped to 3.5 percent in 2019, a drop of one and five-tenths percentage points since 2015. The unemployment rate fluctuated in 2020, ending the month of July at 7.1 percent. The unemployment rate fluctuated across all LWDAs in 2020 and through July 2020. The Northwest Arkansas LWDA unemployment rate fell below state levels through July 2020.

Short-term employment projections for 2019 to 2021 continue to see an increase in the Arkansas job market with 11,050 jobs, equivalent to a 0.92 percent rise in employment. Goods-Producing Industries are estimated to see a net gain of 2,197 jobs, while the Services-Providing Industries are forecast to increase employment by 23,825. Arkansas's self-employed ranks are estimated to experience a net gain of 1,051, an increase of 0.83 percent.

Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are estimated to add more jobs than any other education level with 9,484 jobs between 2019 and 2021. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 6,320.

Arkansas' per capita personal income increased over the 2014-2018 period to \$45,726; however, the state's per capita personal income in 2017 remained below the United States' per capita personal income of \$53,712.

More than a million Arkansas workers earned at least \$10 or more an hour in 2019, with the mean annual wage for all employer sizes estimated at \$42,690. Of the six states surrounding Arkansas, only Mississippi had a lower overall average hourly and average annual wage for all occupations. Of the surrounding states, Texas had the highest average annual wage.

COVID-19

Some of the data in this economic report reflects the impact of COVID-19 while other data sets may not yet reflect the impact. It is unknown what the full impact of COVID-19 will be on the data.

Sources used for this report include the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, Arkansas Department of Workforce Services, Employment Assistance Division, Labor Market Information Section, United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA), the Local Employment Dynamics Program (a partnership between the State of Arkansas and the United States Census Bureau), Population Reference Bureau and The Council for Community and Economic Research (C2ER).

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State of Arkansas

The state of Arkansas' population grew to 3,017,804 in 2019, adding 3,979 from 2018 to 2019 and 39,397 from 2015 to 2019. The State of Arkansas consists of 10 Workforce Development Areas (LW-DAs), six Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), and 75 counties. Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas border the state.

Population Pyramids for Arkansas








Arkansas Population Progression




State Employment/Labor Force/ Unemployment

The labor force increased by 11,146 between 2018 and 2019 and employment increased by 12,831 over the same period. Unemployment decreased by 1,685 from 2018 to 2019, and has seen a decrease of 18,737 since 2015. The state's unemployment rate dropped by two-tenths of a percentage from 2018 to 2019. Over the 2015-2019 period, the unemployment rate dropped 1.5 percentage points to 3.5 percent for 2019. The state's unemployment rate was 7.1 percent in July 2020.



State Median Household/ Per Capita Personal Income

Arkansas' median household income was \$45,726 in 2018 which increased by \$1,913 from 2017 to 2018 but is below the national median household income of \$60,293 for 2018. Arkansas' per capita personal income in 2018 was \$42,566, an increase of \$1,520 from 2017. Over the 2014-2018 period, the per capita personal income increased by \$4,581. The state's per capita personal income is below the United States per capita personal income of \$53,712.

State Employment

In 2019, whites made up 78.3 percent of the labor force while the total of all minority groups made up 21.9 percent of the labor force. The unemployment rate for all races, including Hispanics, was 5.5 percent. The unemployment rate for all minority groups combined was 6.7 percent. Hispanics of all races made up 7.2 percent of the labor force, with an unemployment rate of 4.5 percent.

State Education


Every education category is projected to see positive net growth between 2019 and 2021. Occupations requiring no formal education are projected to add 5,964 jobs during the projection period. Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are expected to add 9,484 jobs during the projection period and had the highest educational attainment between 2014 and 2018 at 34.1 percent. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 6,320 jobs and 14.4 percent of the population 25 years and over had a bachelor's degree in 2018. Growth in occupations requiring a master's degree or doctoral or professional degree is expected to be 738 and 796 jobs respectively. Educational attainment of the state's population aged 25 years and over shows that 86.2 percent have earned at least a high school diploma or equivalent, up 0.6 percent from 2017.



Fast Food and Counter Workers was estimated to have the most employees across the state with 40,720 employed in 2019 with an average wage of \$20,780. Retail Salespersons was the second largest occupation with 38,330 employed, earning an average wage of \$26,480. General and Operations Managers, with an estimated employment of 20,910, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$89,710 annually.

Surgeons, Except Ophthal-mologists topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$248,380.

Anesthesiologists, with an aver-

age annual salary of \$241,710, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.



The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$21,450 for 2019. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$34,614, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$53,300 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 1,217,422 estimated employees, 208,313 made less than \$10 an hour while 286,128 made more than \$25 an hour. Employees making between \$15 and \$19.99 totaled 224,877.





Average Annual Wages for Surrounding States



State Industry

Restaurants and Other Eating Places is slated to add 3,313 jobs between 2019 and 2021, becoming the top growing industry in the state, moving employment to 93,034. **Social Advocacy Organizations** is set to increase its workforce by 17.99 percent, to become the fastest growing industry in the state, moving employment from 4,957 in 2019 to 5,849 in 2021. **General Merchandise Stores** could be the top declining industry for the projection period with a total loss of 740 jobs, or 1.98 percent of its workforce, moving down to 36,571. Many retailers and department stores have closed operations in underperforming markets and the industry is also affected by increased online shopping. Scenic and Sightseeing Transportation is predicted to be the fastest declining industry, losing 53.85 percent of its workforce. **Education and Health Services** is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 7,002 jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 2.28 percent rise in employment.

State Occupations

Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food is projected to be the top growing occupation in the state between 2019 and 2021, adding 1,795 jobs, increasing its workforce to 40,381 jobs. Extruding and Forming Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Synthetic and Glass Fibers is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 19.13 percent, moving from 115 jobs in 2019 to 137 in 2021. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 312 being cut, an amount equivalent to less than one percent of its workforce. Foundry Mold and Coremakers is slated to be the fastest declining occupation, losing 15.56 percent of its workforce, down to 76 jobs. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is forecasted to be the top growing major group for the 2019-2021 projection period, with 4,042 new jobs, moving employment to 114,182.



State Covered Employment and Earnings

According to the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages Report, Arkansas' covered employment grew 0.6 percent from 2018 to 2019. This translates to 6,828 jobs added to the workforce. Of all the major North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) industry supersector groups, three lost jobs during the reference period. State Government lost the most at 882 jobs, also having the fastest decline, losing 1.3 percent of its workforce. Of the nine growing industry groups, Leisure and Hospitality grew the most, adding 2,155 jobs. Manufacturing was the fastest growing industry with a growth of 3.3 percent.

Overall, average weekly earnings in 2019 for the state was \$865.56. The average weekly earnings range from a low of \$332.68 in Leisure and Hospitality to a high of \$1,216.64 in Professional and Business Services.







The LWDA saw an increase in the labor force of 3.617 to 254.750 from 2018 to 2019 and the labor force increased by 8,979 over the 2015 to 2019 period. Employment increased by 3,836 between 2018 and 2019 and increased by 11,818 over the five-year period. The LWDA has seen a decrease in unemployment over the same time periods. From 2018 to 2019, unemployment decreased by 219, and from 2015 to 2019, unemployment decreased by 2,839. The LWDA's unemployment rate dropped by onetenth of a percentage point between 2018 and 2019 and decreased by one and three-tenths percentage points over the five-year period. In 2020, the unemployment rate increased by four percent from January to 7.7 percent in July 2020.

Central Arkansas and State Unemployment Rate*





Food Services and Eating Places is slated to add 658 new jobs between 2019 and 2021, becoming the top growing industry in Central Arkansas, moving employment to 17,026. Data Processing, Hosting, and Related Services is projected to raise employment levels 54.31 percent, becoming the fastest growing industry, moving employment to 304. On the negative side of the job market, Paper Manufacturing is predicted to lose 315 jobs during the 2019-2021 projection period, dropping employment to 1,051. Couriers and Messengers is forecasted to be the fastest declining industry, cutting 38.24 percent of its workforce. **Education and Health Services** is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 957 jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 2.62 percent rise in employment, moving employment to 37,473.







Little Rock Population Progression





The labor force increased in the LWDA by 423 from 2018 to 2019, and saw an increase of 2,124 between 2015 and 2019. Employment increased by 561 from 2018 to 2019 and by 3,187 from 2015 to 2019. Unemployment and the unemployment rate decreased between 2018 to 2019, with unemployment decreasing by 138 and the unemployment rate decreasing by two-tenths of a percentage point to 3.3 percent in 2019. The unemployment rate decreased by one and two-tenths percentage points from 2015 to 2019. The area unemployment rate rose from January 2020 through July 2020, increasing by six and three-tenths of a percentage point to 10.0 percent in July 2020.





Insurance Carriers and Related Activities is predicted to be the top growing industry, increasing employment by 1,253 jobs, to a total employment of 16,475. Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers is slated to be the fastest growing industry, increasing employment by nearly 36 percent, moving from 464 employees in 2019 to 631 in 2021. State Government, Excluding Education and Hospitals is projected to lose 593 employees during the 2019 and 2021 projection period, dropping total employment to 11,710. Wood Product Manufacturing could see a 53.66 percent reduction in employment, becoming the fastest declining industry in the City of Little Rock WDA. **Financial Activities** is forecasted to be the top growing supersector, adding 1,469 new jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 6.50 percent rise in employment.

Insurance Sales Agents lead the City of Little Rock WDA in numeric growth, adding 761 jobs between 2019 and 2021, moving employment to 9,963. Sewing Machine Operators could increase significantly during the projection period, raising employment 90 percent to a level of 181. On the negative side of the local economy, Secretaries and Administrative Assistants, Except Legal, Medical, and Executive is slated to lose the most jobs, with 39 being cut, dropping employment to 2,686. Cabinetmakers and Bench Carpenters could lose 7.14 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation in the area, and moving employment down to 78. **Sales and Related Occupations** is anticipated to be the top growing major group, raising employment 845 new jobs between 2019 and 2021 to a level of 26,582.







Eastern Arkansas Population Progression





The labor force in the Eastern Arkansas LWDA decreased by 511 to 46,243 in 2019 from 2018, and has decreased by 2,377 from 2015 to 2019. Employment decreased from 2018 to 2019, losing 459 workers to 44,083. Unemployment saw a slight decrease from 2018 to 2019, having 52 fewer unemployed, but that wasn't enough to change the unemployment rate from 4.7 percent. Since the beginning of 2020, the unemployment rate fluctuated from 5.4 percent in January to 12.8 percent in April, ending July 2020 at 10.0 percent.





Eastern Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Merchant Wholesalers, Durable Goods is projected to be the top growing industry, increasing employment by 240 jobs to an employment level of 1,164. Beverage and Tobacco Product Manufacturing is slated to be the fastest growing industry, raising employment levels by 44.44 percent, increasing from 135 jobs in 2019 to 195 in 2021. On the negative side of the job market, Educational Services could see a drop of 261 jobs to an employment level of 4,135, as population declines have hit this area hard in recent years. Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing could lose 44.24 percent of its workforce between 2019 and 2021, dropping employment levels below 100. Leisure and Hospitality is anticipated to be the top and fastest growing supersector with a gain of 427 jobs, an 11.13 percent increase, moving total employment to 4,265.

Landscaping and Groundskeeping Workers is predicted to be the top growing occupation in the Eastern Arkansas WDA between 2019 and 2021, adding 55 jobs, increasing its workforce to 266 jobs. Amusement and Recreation Attendants is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing employment by 35.71 percent, to a level of 76. On the negative side of the labor market, Elementary School Teachers, Except Special Education, could see a drop of 39 jobs, as population declines could affect jobs in education. Farmworkers, Farm, Ranch, and Aquacultural Animals is projected to lose 23.26 percent of its workforce during the projection period, becoming the fastest declining occupation in the area. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is forecasted to be the top growing major group for the 2019-2021 projection period, with 137 new jobs, moving employment to 3,585.













Transportation Equipment Manufacturing leads North Central Arkansas as the top growing industry, anticipated to add 433 new jobs, increasing its workforce to 1,707. Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers is set to raise employment levels to 118 jobs, an increase of 51.28 percent, to become the fastest growing industry. Wood Product Manufacturing could be the top and fastest declining industry, losing 268 jobs, or 48.03 percent of its workforce. Manufacturing is estimated to be the top growing supersector, adding 628 jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 6.95 percent rise in employment.

Assemblers and Fabricators, All Other, Including Team Assemblers is projected to be the top growing occupation in North Central Arkansas, adding 124 new jobs, increasing employment to 828. Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Technical and Scientific Products is slated to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing by 30.23 percent, for a total employment of 56. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 113 being cut, an amount equivalent to 1.34 percent of its workforce. 



Northeast Arkansas Population Progression









Northeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Occupations

Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food is projected to be the top growing occupation in Northeast Arkansas between 2019 and 2021, adding 172 jobs, increasing its workforce to 4,73 jobs. Agricultural and Food Science Technicians is forecasted to be the fastest growing industry, with a 19.67 percent increase, moving from 61 employees in 2019 to 73 in 2021. Cashiers as well as Maids and Housekeeping Cleaners are slated to lead the area as the top declining industry, each losing 44 jobs. Sawing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Wood is estimated to be the fastest declining occupation, cutting 20.93 percent of its workforce. **Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations** is projected to add 394 new jobs between 2019 and 2021, becoming the top growing major group, and increasing its workforce to 8,194. A 5.05 percent increase.



Northeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development **Area Covered Employment and Earnings**





Northwest Arkansas Population Progression




Northwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area **Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment**

The Northwest Arkansas LWDA labor force and employment both increased from 2018 to 2019, with the labor force gaining 5,510 to 327,641 and employment increasing by 6,019 to 318,720. Unemployment decreased by 509 to 8,921 in 2019, and has seen a decline of 2,908 since 2015. The unemployment rate dropped from 2018 to 2019 by two-tenths of a percentage point to 2.7 percent. The area's unemployment rate decreased by a total of one and two-tenths percentage points from 2015. The unemployment rate ended July 2020 at 5.8 percent.



Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was estimated to have the most employees in Northwest Arkansas with 13,180 employed in 2019 with an average wage of \$47,630. Retail Salespersons was

the second largest occupa-



tion with 10,670 employed, earning an average wage of \$26,427. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 5,430, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$99,477 annually.

Nurse Anesthetists topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$252,597. **Family Medicine Physicians**, with an average annual salary of \$229,179, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$22,099 for 2019. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$36,835, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$57,632 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 292,323 estimated employees in the area, 76,968 made more than \$25 an hour while 43,480 made less than \$10 an hour. Employees making between \$15 and \$19.99 totaled 51,560.



Northwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is slated to add 1,376 jobs between 2019 and 2021, becoming the top growing industry in the Northwest Arkansas WDA, moving employment to 8,663. Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers is set to increase its workforce by 41.62 percent, to become the fastest growing industry in the area, moving employment from 1,540 in 2019 to 2,181 in 2021. On the negative side of the economy, Management of Companies and Enterprises could be the top declining industry for the projection period with a total loss of 347 jobs, or 1.53 percent of its workforce, moving down to 22,381. Primary Metal Manufacturing is slated to be the fastest declining industry, cutting more than a quarter of its workforce, or 250 jobs, moving employment down to 651. **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 2,190 jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 3.55 percent rise in employment.

Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is slated to be the top growing occupation in Northwest Arkansas between 2019 and 2021, increasing its workforce to 14,447. Clergy is expected to be the fastest growing occupation, raising employment levels by 19.29 percent to a total employment of 3,284. On the negative side of the local economy, Assemblers and Fabricators, All Other, Including Team Assemblers is predicted to lose the most jobs, 55 between 2019 and 2021. Grinding, Lapping, Polishing, and Buffing Machine Tool Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Metal and Plastic is anticipated to lose 13.90 percent of its workforce, to become the fastest declining occupation, dropping employment to 192. Transportation and Material Moving Occupations is predicted to be the top growing major group adding 1,162 jobs during the projection period to a total employment of 31,988.

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





Southeast Arkansas Population Progression





Southeast Arkansas saw a slight increase in the labor force of 139 to 81,524 from 2018 to 2019, and employment increased by 121 to 77,671 for the same time period. Both the labor force and employment have decreased since 2015 by 2,165 and 587 respectively. Unemployment increased by 18 to 3,853 from 2018 to 2019 and the unemployment rate remained at 4.7 percent in 2019. After starting at 5.6 percent in January 2020, the unemployment rate rose two and nine-tenths percentage points to 8.5 percent in July 2020.





Southeast Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Amusement, Gambling, and Recreation Industries is projected to be the top and fastest growing industry in Southeast Arkansas, more than doubling its employment between 2019 and 2021. On the negative side of the local economy, Paper Manufacturing could lose 510 jobs, or 16.02 percent of its workforce, dropping its employment to 2,673. Private Households is slated to lose 55.92 percent of its workforce, or 137 jobs, dropping employment from 245 jobs in 2019 to 108 jobs in 2021. **Leisure and Hospitality** is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 400 jobs between 2019 and 2021, an 8.80 percent rise in employment.

Personal Care Aides is projected to lead Southeast Arkansas in numeric change, growing by 117 jobs, to an employment level of 117. Cooks, Restaurants is slated to grow by 8.74 percent, moving employment from 309 jobs in 2019 to 336 in 2021. On the reverse side of the labor market, Paper Goods Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders is anticipated to lose 76 jobs, a 13.45 percent drop to 489 employees. Chemical Equipment Operators and Tenders is forecasted to cut 15.15 percent of its workforce between 2019 and 2021, dropping below 200 employees. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is estimated to be the top growing major group during the 2019-2021 projection period, with 196 new jobs, moving employment four percent to 5,096.









The Southwest Arkansas LWDA labor force increased from 2018 to 2019 by 72 to 92,687, while employment increased by 248 to 88,562. Over the five-year period from 2015 to 2019, the area has seen a decrease of 2,110 in the labor force and decrease of 850 in employment. Unemployment decreased by 176 from 2018 to 2019, and decreased by 1,260 over the five-year period. The unemployment rate dropped by one-tenth of a percentage point from 2018 to 2019 to 4.5 percent. After various fluctuations in the unemployment rate during 2019, the rate settled at 7.8 percent in July 2020.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$20,700 for 2019. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$36,479, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$47,216 for employers in all size categories.



Southwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Food Services and Drinking Places is estimated to be the top growing industry in Southwest Arkansas, adding 186 jobs, for an employment level of 4,806. Warehousing and Storage could raise employment levels by 54.26 percent, moving from 94 jobs in 2019 to 145 in 2021. On the negative side of the labor market, Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is slated to lose 244 jobs, dropping employment to 1,763. Support Activities for Agriculture and Forestry is forecasted to cut 109 jobs, or 29.95 percent of its workforce, dropping from 364 jobs in 2019 to 255 in 2021. **Education and Health Services** is estimated to be the top growing supersector, adding 253 jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 1.35 percent rise in employment to a level of 18,957.

Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food is projected to be the top growing occupation in Southwest Arkansas between 2019 and 2021, adding 84 jobs, increasing its workforce to 2,258 jobs. Light Truck or Delivery Services Drivers is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 8.57 percent, moving from 467 jobs in 2019 to 507 in 2021. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 195 being cut, an amount equivalent to 3.47 percent of its workforce. Reporters and Correspondents is slated to lose 30 percent of its workforce during the projection period. **Construction and Extraction Occupations** is forecasted to be the top growing major group for the 2019-2021 projection period, with 179 new jobs, or 3.59 percent gain, moving employment to 5,170.



Southwest Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area **Covered Employment and Earnings**







West Central Arkansas Population Progression







Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is predicted to be the top growing major group adding 746 new jobs and increasing employment levels to 4,362. Petroleum and Coal Product Manufacturing is slated to be the fastest growing industry in West Central Arkansas, raising employment by 28.43 percent to 131. Private Households could be the top and fastest declining industry, cutting 137 jobs, or 45.36 percent of its workforce, between 2019 and 2021, dropping employment to 165. Other Services (Except Government) is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 663 jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 12.18 percent rise in employment.

Clergy is estimated to be the top and fastest growing occupation in the West Central Arkansas WDA, with a gain of 288 new jobs, an increase of 20.92 percent, moving from 1,377 jobs in 2019 to 1,665 in 2021. On the reverse side of the labor market, Maids and Housekeeping Cleaners is slated to be the top declining occupation, losing 59 jobs, dropping employment to 1,119. Sewing Machine Operators is forecasted to cut 23.64 percent of its workforce, dropping below 50 employees. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is projected to be the top growing major group for the 2019-2021 projection period, with 447 new jobs, moving employment to 12,559.



West Central Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area **Covered Employment and Earnings**







Western Arkansas Population Progression




Western Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The Western Arkansas LWDA labor force decreased by 343 to 112,131 and employment decreased by 94 to 108,262 from 2018 to 2019. Over the 2015-2019 period, the labor force decreased by 1,754 while employment decreased by 127. Unemployment and the unemployment rate both decreased significantly from 2015 to 2019. Unemployment decreased by 1,881 to 3,869 unemployed, while the unemployment rate dropped by two and five-tenths percentage points to 3.5 percent. The area's unemployment rate fluctuated through 2020, ending at 7.0 percent in July.




Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2020



Western Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Wages

Fast Food and Counter Workers was estimated to have the most employees in Western Arkansas with 4,140 employed in 2019 with an average wage of \$20,657. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was the second largest occupation with 4,120 employed, earning an average wage of \$47,991. Registered Nurses, with an estimated employment of 2,350, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$58,165 annually.

Family Medicine Physicians topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$236,822. Marketing Managers, with an average annual salary of \$154,554, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.



On the negative side of the labor market, Machinery Manufacturing is predicted to lose 177 jobs, dropping employment to 836, becoming the top declining industry. Nonstore Retailers is estimated to be the fastest declining occupation, cutting 28.77 percent of its workforce. **Education and Health Services** is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 767 jobs between 2019 and 2021, a 3.11 percent rise in employment.

Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Including Fast Food is projected to be the top growing occupation in Western Arkansas between 2019 and 2021, adding 192 jobs, increasing its workforce to 4,016 jobs. Taxi Drivers and Chauffeurs is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 9.83 percent, moving from 356 jobs in 2019 to 391 in 2021. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 626 being cut, an amount equivalent to 11.93 percent of its workforce. Farmworkers, Farm, Ranch, and Aquacultural Animals is forecasted to cut 20.12 percent of its workforce, dropping its employment to 258. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is estimated to be the top growing major group for the 2019-2021 projection period, with 360 new jobs, moving employment to 9,715.


