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Executive Summary

The 2022 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Occupational/Career Information unit of the Labor Market Information section to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Development Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2017 to 2021, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2021 to 2023.

Arkansas grew in population in 2021 by 14,349 from 2020, and added a total of 22,894 new residents from 2017 to 2021. Of Arkansas's 10 Local Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), Northwest Arkansas saw the largest increase in population, adding 15,316 in 2021. The Little Rock, Eastern,, Southeast, and Southwest Arkansas LWDAs saw decreasing populations in 2021.

Between 2020 and 2021 the state's labor force decreased by 21,676, but employment increased by 6,640. Labor force and employment varied across the LWDAs. The state's unemployment rate dropped to 4.0 percent in 2021, an increase of three-tenths of a percentage point since 2017. The unemployment remained relatively steady in 2022, ending the month of July at 3.3 percent. The unemployment rate fluctuated across all LW-DAs in 2022 and through July 2022.

Short-term employment projections for 2021 to 2023 showed an increase in the Arkansas job market with a gain of 29,811 jobs, equivalent to a 2.13 percent growth in employment. Goods-Producing industries are estimated to see a net gain of 5,180 jobs, while the Services-Providing industries are forecast to increase employment by 24,721. Arkansas' self-employed ranks are estimated to experience a net loss of 90, a decrease of 0.09 percent.

Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are estimated to add more jobs than any other education level with 11,099 jobs between 2021 and 2023. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 7,511. Arkansas' per capita personal income increased over the 2017-2021 period to \$51,148; however, the state's per capita personal income in 2021 remained below the United States' per capita personal income of \$63,444.

More than a million Arkansas workers earned at least \$12 or more an hour in 2021, with the mean annual wage for all employer sizes estimated at \$46,488. Of the six states surrounding Arkansas, only Mississippi had a lower overall average hourly and average annual wage for all occupations. Of the surrounding states, Texas had the highest average annual wage.



The state of Arkansas' population grew to 3,025,891 in 2021, increasing 14,349 from 2020 to 2021 and increasing 22,894 from 2017 to 2021. The state of Arkansas consists of 10 Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), six Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), and 75 counties. Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas border the state.




Population Pyramids for Arkansas


Percentage of Population for Children (Under 20), Adults (24-64), and Older Adults (65+)




Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment



The labor force decreased by 21,676 between 2020 and 2021, but employment increased by 6,640 over the same period. Unemployment decreased by 28,316 from 2020 to 2021, but has seen an increase of 3,805 since 2017. The state's unemployment rate declined by 2.1 percent from 2020 to 2021. Over the 2017-2021 period, the unemployment rate rose 0.3 percentage points to 4.0 percent for 2021. The state's unemployment rate was 3.3 percent in July 2022.




Arkansas 2017-2021 Labor Force/Employment






Median Household/Per Capita Personal Income

Arkansas' median household income was \$51,183 in 2020 which increased by \$3,586 from 2019 to 2020 but is below the national median household income of \$67,340 for 2020. Arkansas' per capita personal income in 2021 was \$51,148, an increase of \$4,039 from 2020. Over the 2017-2021 period, the per capita personal income increased by \$10,102. The state's per capita personal income is below the United States per capita personal income of \$63,444.



Employment



In 2021, whites made up 76.7 percent of the labor force while the total of all minority groups made up 23.3 percent of the labor force. The unemployment rate for all races, including Hispanics, was 4.0 percent. The unemployment rate for all minority groups combined was 6.1 percent. Hispanics of all races made up 7.6 percent of the labor force, with an unemployment rate of 3.6 percent.

Arkansas Education




All eight education categories are projected to see positive net growth between 2021 and 2023. Occupations requiring no formal education are projected to gain 7,143 jobs during the projection period. Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are expected to gain 11,099 jobs during the projection period and had the highest educational attainment in 2020 at 34.4 percent. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 7,511 jobs and 15.8 percent of the population 25 years and over had a bachelor's degree in 2020. Growth in occupations requiring a master's degree or doctoral or professional degree is expected to be 482 and 330 jobs respectively. Educational attainment of the state's population aged 25 years and over shows that 88.2 percent have earned at least a high school diploma or equivalent, up 0.7 percent from 2019.


Arkansas Wages



Fast Food and Counter Workers was estimated to have the most employees across the state with 34,530 employed in 2021 with an average wage of \$24,290. **Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers** was the second largest occupation with 32,560 employed, earning an average wage of \$49,090. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 27,120, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$85,080 annually.

Emergency Medicine Physi-

cians topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$343,650.



Ophthalmologists, Except Pediatric, with an average annual salary of \$332,430, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$24,835 for 2021. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$37,211, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$57,325 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 1,113,820 estimated employees with hourly wage data, 107,560 made less than \$12 an hour while 251,790 made more than \$27 an hour. Employees making between \$17 and \$21.99 totaled 212,670.







STEM Employment in Arkansas





Insurance Carriers is projected to be the top growing industry in Arkansas, gaining 2,828 new jobs between 2021 and 2023, increasing its overall workforce in the state to 23,292. **Motion Picture and Video Industries** could see a 23.40 percent rise in jobs, becoming the fastest growing industry in the state, after having the worst drop in its history during the pandemic shutdowns. **Elementary and Secondary Schools** could see a difficult projection period, estimated to lose 1,872 jobs, becoming the top declining industry, dropping overall employment to near 74,000. **Electric Lighting Equipment Manufacturing** is slated to be the fastest declining industry, cutting 31.27 percent of its workforce, driving its total employment down to 178. **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** is forecast to be the top growing supersector, anticipated to add 6,666 new jobs during the projection period, an increase of 2.66 percent.

Stockers and Order Fillers is predicted to be the top growing industry as grocery stores and other retail establishments battle keeping store shelves stocked. The industry is expected to add 1,127 between 2021 and 2023 to a level of 21,586. **Ushers, Lobby Attendants, and Ticket Takers** could see a 14.72 percent rise during the projection period, becoming the fastest growing occupation as movie theaters and other entertainment venues strive to return to normal. **Elementary School Teachers, Except Special Education** is estimated to be the top declining occupation, losing 283 jobs statewide, as some districts navigate financial hardships due to the pandemic. **Derrick Operators, Oil and Gas** is slated to be the fastest declining occupation, losing an estimated 17.78 percent of its workforce, dropping employment below 40 statewide. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is predicted to be the top growing major group, adding 4,327 new jobs to the Arkansas economy, moving its Arkansas workforce to 142,869.

According to the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages Report, Arkansas' covered employment increased by 2.5 percent from 2020 to 2021. This translates to 28,452 jobs gained. Of all the major North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) industry supersector groups, all but three gained jobs during the reference period. Leisure and Hospitality gained the most at 9,692 jobs and had the fastest growth, increasing 9.1 percent. Of the three declining industry groups, State Government declined the most, losing 1,970 jobs, making the fastest declining industry as well with a decline of 3.0 percent.

Overall, average weekly earnings in 2021 for the state was \$981.78. The average weekly earnings range from a low of \$393.60 in **Leisure and Hospitality** to a high of \$1,441.80 in **Information**. 




Population Pyramids for Central Arkansas





The LWDA saw a decrease in the labor force of 3,585 to 247,793 from 2020 to 2021, and the labor force increased by 3,050 over the 2017 to 2021 period. Employment increased by 2,136 between 2020 and 2021, but decreased by 4,198 over the five-year period. The LWDA has seen an fluctuation in unemployment over the same time periods. From 2020 to 2021, unemployment decreased by 5,721, but from 2017 to 2021, unemployment increased by 1,148. The LWDA's unemployment rate rose by 0.5 percent over the five-year period. In 2022, the unemployment rate rose by three-tenths of a percent from January to 3.8 percent in July 2022.



Fast Food and Counter Workers was estimated to have the most employees in Central Arkansas with 3,260 employed in 2021 with an average wage of \$24,429. **Cashiers** was the second largest occupation with 3,040 employed, earning an average wage of \$24,789. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 2,080, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$79,341 annually.

Ophthalmologists, Except Pediatric topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$338,417. **Family Medicine Physicians**, with an average annual salary of \$273,787, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.





Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Administrative and Support Services is slated to add 865 new jobs between 2021 and 2023, becoming the top growing industry in Central Arkansas, moving employment to 8,803. Warehousing and Storage is projected to raise employment levels 40.47 percent, becoming the fastest growing industry, moving employment to 2,159. On the negative side of the job market, Credit Intermediation and Related Activities could see 186 less employees by first quarter 2023, becoming the top declining industry. Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers is forecast to be the fastest declining industry, cutting 23.01 percent of its workforce, moving to 231 jobs. The **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** supersector leads the area, with 1,392 new jobs, moving employment to 40,518.







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

Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The labor force decreased in the LWDA by 1,967 from 2020 to 2021, and saw a decrease of 1,725 between 2017 and 2021. Employment increased by 482 from 2020 to 2021, but decreased by 3,391 from 2017 to 2021. Unemployment and the unemployment rate decreased between 2020 to 2021, with unemployment decreasing by 2,449 and the unemployment rate decreasing by 2.5 percent to 5.1 percent in 2021. The unemployment rate increased by 1.8 percent from 2017 to 2021. The area unemployment rate fluctuated from January 2022 through July 2022, settling to 4.5 percent in July 2022.

Registered Nurses was estimated to have the most employees in Little Rock with 8,850 employed in 2021 with an average wage of \$70,466. **Retail Salespersons** is the second largest occupation with 6,840 employed, earning an average wage of \$28,830. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 5,560, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$89,826 annually.

Radiologists topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$346,368. **Physicians, Pathologists**, with an average annual salary of \$341,362, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.





City of Little Rock Local Workforce Development Area Wages



Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Insurance Carriers and Related Activities is predicted to be the top growing industry, increasing employment by 1,410 jobs, to a total employment of 17,127. Warehousing and Storage is slated to be the fastest growing industry, increasing by 472.54 percent during the 2021-2023 projection period. Educational Services is projected to be the top declining industry, decreasing its workforce by 507 jobs, or 4.67 percent of its workforce. However, Machinery Manufacturing fared much worse, with a projected drop of 49.21 percent of its workforce, bringing its employment down to 194. **Financial Activities** is forecasted to be the top and fastest growing supersector, adding 1,394 new jobs between 2021 and 2023, a 6.12 percent rise in employment.

Insurance Claims and Policy Processing Clerks leads the City of Little Rock WDA in numeric growth, adding 419 jobs, or 10.92 percent gain, between 2021 and 2023, moving employment to 4,257. Industrial Truck and Tractor Operators could increase significantly during the projection period, raising employment 61.89 percent to a level of 497. On the negative side of the local economy, Elementary School Teachers, Except Special Education is slated to lose the most jobs, with 83 being cut, dropping employment to 1,528. Cabinetmakers and Bench Carpenters is forecast to experience a 15.38 percent reduction in staffing. **Sales and Related Occupations** is anticipated to be the top growing major group, raising employment by 700 new jobs between 2021 and 2023 to a level of 19,563.





The labor force in the Eastern Arkansas LWDA decreased by 151 to 47,583 in 2021 from 2020, and has decreased by 3,331 from 2017 to 2021. Employment decreased from 2020 to 2021, losing 1,017 workers to 41,099. Unemployment saw a decrease from 2020 to 2021, having 1,134 fewer unemployed, enough to change the unemployment rate from 7.9 percent to 5.7 percent. Since the beginning of 2022, the unemployment rate fluctuated from 5.3 percent in January, ending July 2022 at 6.0 percent.









Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Truck Transportation is projected to be the top growing industry, increasing employment by 188 jobs to an employment level of 1,254. Support Activities for Agriculture and Forestry is slated to be the fastest growing industry, raising employment levels by 28.72 percent, increasing from 564 jobs in 2021 to 726 in 2023. On the negative side of the job market, Educational Services could see a drop of 207 jobs to an employment level of 3,434, as population declines continue to plague the area. Non-store Retailers could see a 52.94 loss of jobs, hitting an already small industry presence even smaller. The **Leisure and Hospitality** supersector is estimated to gain 77 new jobs between first quarter 2021 and first quarter 2023.

Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is predicted to be the top growing occupation in the Eastern Arkansas WDA between 2021 and 2023, adding 108 jobs, increasing its workforce to 1,511 jobs. Animal Trainers is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing employment by 14.10 percent, to a level of 178. On the negative side of the labor market, Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a drop of 101 jobs, 6.04 percent of its workforce. Telecommunications Equipment Installers and Repairers, Except Line Installers is slated to lose 30.43 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing major group for the 2021-2023 projection period, with 87 new jobs, moving employment to 4,768.



Population Pyramids for North Central Arkansas















Percentage of Population for Children (Under 20), Adults (24-64), and Older Adults (65+)











Primary Metal Manufacturing is predicted to be the top growing industry, adding 584 jobs between 2021 and 2023, moving employment to 4,366. Private Households is set to increase its workforce by 25.81 percent, to become the fastest growing industry in Northeast Arkansas, moving employment from 403 in 2021 to 507 in 2023. Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing is projected to lose the most jobs, cutting 74 jobs from its workforce, dropping its employment levels to 485. Publishing Industries (except Internet) could see a drop of 40 percent from its workforce, dropping its employment levels to near 50. **Manufacturing** could see a rise of 1,537 employees, to become the top growing supersector, moving its employment levels to 22,672.

Industrial Machinery Mechanics is projected to be the top growing occupation in Northeast Arkansas between 2021 and 2023, adding 154 jobs, increasing its workforce to 1,396 jobs. Public Relations Specialists is forecast to be the fastest growing industry, with a 53.03 percent increase, moving from 66 employees in 2021 to 101 in 2023. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a reduction of 63 jobs, or 1.49 percent of its workforce. Floral Designers is estimated to cut 5.88 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation in the area. **Production Occupations** is projected to add 765 new jobs between 2021 and 2023, becoming the top growing major group, and increasing its workforce to 15,122, a 5.33 percent increase.

Local Workforce Development Area Covered Employment and Earnings








Population Pyramids for Northwest Arkansas






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Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The Northwest Arkansas LWDA labor force and employment increased from 2020 to 2021, with the labor force gaining 1,107 to 332,059 and employment increasing by 6,812 to 322,170. Unemployment decreased by 5,705 to 9,889 in 2021, but has seen an increase of 441 since 2017. The unemployment rate dropped from 2020 to 2021 by 2.7 percent to 3.0 percent. The area's unemployment rate fluctuated from 2017, but ultimately settled at 3.0 in 2021. The unemployment rate ended July 2022 at 3.0 percent.




Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2022

Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was estimated to have the most employees in Northwest Arkansas with 11,870 employed in 2021 with an average wage of \$54,381. Fast Food and Counter Workers was the second



largest occupation with 8,430 employed, earning an average wage of \$25,010. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 6,290, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$89,548 annually.

Cardiologists topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$406,096. **Surgeons, All Other**, with an average annual salary of \$367,106, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$25,563 for 2021. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$37,544, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$62,358 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 260,790 estimated employees in the area with hourly wage data, 67,680 made more than \$27 an hour while 7,830 made less than \$12 an hour. Employees making between \$17 and \$21.99 totaled 53,570.





Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is slated to add 1,871 jobs between 2021 and 2023, becoming the top growing industry in the Northwest Arkansas WDA, moving employment to 13,317. Chemical Manufacturing is predicted to be the fastest growing industry, increasing by 29.02 percent. On the negative side of the economy, Private Households is forecast to cut 66 jobs during the 2021-2023 projection period, a 5.31 percent reduction. Transit and Ground Passenger Transportation could see loss of 15.42, dropping to 170 jobs by 2023. **Professional and Business Services** leads all supersectors in Northwest Arkansas in numeric change, with 2,727 new jobs, a 5.46 percent gain, moving employment from 49,937 in 2021 to 52,664 in 2023.





Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is slated to be the top growing occupation in Northwest Arkansas between 2021 and 2023, increasing its workforce to 14,588. Fundraisers is projected to be the fastest growing occupation, driving up employment 35.70 percent to 802 jobs. On the negative side of the local economy, Tellers is expected to lose 27 jobs, or 2.11 percent of its workforce between 2021 and 2023. Advertising Sales Agents could lose 4.94 percent of its workforce, becoming the fast-est declining occupation in the area, dropping employment to 236. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is predicted to be the top growing major group adding 1,427 new jobs during the projection period to a total employment of 37,555.










Population Pyramids for Southeast Arkansas



Southeast Arkansas Population Progression





Southeast Arkansas saw a decrease in the labor force of 2,991 to 76,960 from 2020 to 2021, and employment decreased by 1,602 to 72,750 for the same time period. Both the labor force and employment have decreased since 2017 by 4,378 and 4,727 respectively. Unemployment decreased by 1,389 to 4,210 from 2020 to 2021 and the unemployment rate decreased to 5.5 percent in 2021. After starting at 5.6 percent in January 2022, the unemployment rate fluctuated, ultimately settling to 6.1 percent in July 2022.



Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2022







was estimated to have the most employees in Southeast Arkansas with 1,900 employed in 2021 with an average wage of \$23,730. **Cashiers** was the second largest occupation with 1,840 employed, earning an average wage of \$24,034. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 1,320, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$81,476 annually.

Emergency Medicine Physicians topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$380,228. **Surgeons, All Other**, with an average annual salary of \$200,238, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was

\$24,378 for 2021. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$37,107, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$51,917 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 58,830 estimated employees in the area with hourly wage data, 6,680 made less than \$12 an hour while 13,560 made \$17 to \$21.99 an hour. Employees making more than \$27 an hour totaled 10,500.





Local Workforce Development Area Industry

Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is projected to be the top growing industry in Southeast Arkansas, increasing its workforce by 63 new jobs, a 6.52 percent gain. Transportation Equipment Manufacturing is slated to be the fastest growing industry, raising employment levels by 9.84 percent. On the negative side of the local economy, Educational Services could lose 355 employees, dropping 4.83 percent of its workforce. Primary Metal Manufacturing is set to be the fastest declining industry, cutting its workforce by 15.50 percent, moving from 129 jobs in 2021 to 109 in 2023. **Leisure and Hospitality** is anticipated to be the top and fastest growing supersector, adding 314 jobs between 2021 and 2023, a 6.31 percent rise in employment.

Clergy is projected to lead Southeast Arkansas in numeric change, growing by 82 jobs, reaching an employment level of 1,211. Fundraisers is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing its workforce by 30 percent. On the reverse side of the labor market, Elementary School Teachers, Except Special Education is anticipated to lose 39 jobs, a 4.44 percent drop to 840 employees. Electrical Power-Line Installers and Repairers is slated to cut 7.02 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest growing occupation. **Community and Social Service Occupations** is estimated to be the top growing major group during the 2021-2023 projection period, with 106 new jobs, moving employment 3.88 percent to 2,837.





The Southwest Arkansas LWDA labor force decreased from 2020 to 2021 by 2,484 to 88,656, while employment decreased by 627 to 84,557. Over the five-year period from 2017 to 2021, the area has seen a decrease of 4,106 in the labor force and decrease of 4,069 in employment. Unemployment decreased by 1,857 from 2020 to 2021, and decreased by 36 over the five-year period. The unemployment rate dropped by 1.9 percent from 2020 to 2021 to 4.6 percent. 
Southwest Arkansas LWDA 2017-2021 Labor Force/Employment






Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing is estimated to be the top growing industry in Southwest Arkansas, adding 191 jobs, for an employment level of 2,814. Warehousing and Storage could raise employment levels by 18.37 percent, moving from 98 jobs in 2021 to 116 in 2023. On the negative side of the labor market, Educational Services is slated to lose 324 jobs, dropping employment to 7,614. Private Households is forecast to cut 146 jobs, or 34.19 percent of its workforce, dropping from 427 jobs in 2021 to 281 in 2023, becoming the fastest declining industry in the area. **Manufacturing** is estimated to be the top growing supersector, with a projected gain of 228 new jobs between 2021 and 2023, a 1.21 percent rise in employment to a level of 19,130.

Laborers and Freight, Stock, and Material Movers, Hand is projected to be the top growing occupation in Southwest Arkansas between 2021 and 2023, adding 66 jobs, increasing its workforce to 2,935 jobs. Nurse Practitioners could be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 10.07 percent, moving from 139 jobs in 2021 to 153 in 2023. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 196 being cut, an amount equivalent to 4.21 percent of its workforce. 




Population Pyramids for West Central Arkansas



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West Central Arkansas Population Progression




West Central Arkansas Local Workforce Development Area Wages





Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is predicted to be the top growing major group adding 445 new jobs and increasing employment levels to 5,351. Nonstore Retailers is slated to be the fastest growing industry in West Central Arkansas, raising employment by 13.79 percent. As many other areas have seen job loss, Educational Services could see a loss of 403 jobs, or 3.34 percent decline, dropping employment to 11,664. Machinery Manufacturing is slated to lose 25.09 percent of the workforce, becoming the fastest declining industry. **Other Services (Except Government)** is forecast to be the top and fastest growing supersector, adding 420 jobs between 2021 and 2023, a 6.22 percent rise in employment.



Stockers and Order Fillers is estimated to be the top growing occupation, with a gain of 98 jobs, moving employment to 2,399. Fundraisers is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation in the West Central Arkansas WDA, with a 22.66 percent increase. On the reverse side of the labor market, Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers is slated to be the top declining occupation, losing 237 jobs, dropping employment to 5,973. Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Technical and Scientific Products is anticipated to be the fastest declining occupation, losing an estimated 17.39 percent of its workforce. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is projected to be the top growing major group for the 2021-2023 projection period, with 174 new jobs, moving employment to 12,674.



Local Workforce Development Area Covered Employment and Earnings








Population Pyramids for Western Arkansas







The Western Arkansas LWDA labor force decreased by 3,391 to 107,703 and employment decreased by 919 to 103,662 from 2020 to 2021. Over the 2017-2021 period, the labor force decreased by 5,200 while employment decreased by 5,109. Unemployment and the unemployment rate both fluctuated from 2017 to 2021. Unemployment ultimately decreased by 91 to 4,041 unemployed, while the unemployment rate rose by 0.1 percent to 3.8 percent. The area's unemployment rate fluctuated through 2022, ending at 3.8 percent in July.

was estimated to have the most employees in Western Arkansas with 3,630 employed in 2021 with an average wage of \$48,502. **Fast Food and Counter Workers** was the second largest occupation with 2,970 employed, earning an average wage of \$23,635. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 2,140, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$78,593 annually.

Obstetricians and Gynecologists topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an

annual salary of \$337,451. **Emergency Medicine Physicians**, with an average annual salary of \$321,752, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.


The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$24,253 for 2021. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$36,150, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$51,896 for employers in all size categories.







Administrative and Support Services leads the Western Arkansas WDA region in numeric growth, adding an anticipated 365 new jobs, and moving employment levels to 6,340. Motion Picture and Sound Recording Industries is slated to experience a significant increase due to a new business and recovery from the pandemic, potentially more than tripling in size during the projection period. On the negative side of the labor market, Truck Transportation is predicted to lose 147 jobs, dropping employment to 3.733, becoming the top declining industry. Publishing Industries (except Internet) is estimated to cut 36.23 percent from its workforce during the projection period, dropping employment below 50. **Manufacturing** is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 629 jobs between 2021 and 2023, a 3.12 percent rise in employment.

Stockers and Order Fillers is projected to be the top growing occupation in Western Arkansas between 2021 and 2023, adding 77 jobs, increasing its workforce to 2,037 jobs. Fundraisers is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 23.53 percent, moving from 51 jobs in 2021 to 63 in 2022. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 121 being cut, an amount equivalent to 3.06 percent of its workforce. Editors is forecast to cut 20.83 percent of its workforce, dropping its employment to 19. **Production Occupations** is estimated to be the top growing major group for the 2021-2023 projection period, with 398 new jobs, moving employment to 15,094.


