Executive Summary

The 2023 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Occupational/Career Information unit of the Labor Market Information section to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Development Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2018 to 2022, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2022 to 2024.

Arkansas grew in population in 2022 by 19,746 from 2021, and added a total of 31,812 new residents from 2018 to 2022. Of Arkansas's 10 Local Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), Northwest Arkansas saw the largest increase in population, adding 16,934 in 2022. The Eastern, Northeast, Southeast, and Southwest Arkansas LWDAs saw decreasing populations in 2022.

Between 2021 and 2022 the state's labor force increased by 36,747, and employment increased by 44,965. Labor force and employment varied across the LWDAs. The state's unemployment rate dropped to 3.3 percent in 2022, a decrease of fourtenths of a percentage point since 2018. The unemployment remained relatively steady in 2023, ending the month of July at 2.6 percent. The unemployment rate fluctuated across all LW-DAs in 2023 and through July 2023.

Short-term employment projections for 2022 to 2024 showed an increase in the Arkansas job market with a gain of 39,058 jobs, equivalent to a 2.71 percent growth in employment. Goods-Producing industries are estimated to see a net gain of 5,950 jobs, while the Services-Providing industries are forecast to increase employment by 31,683. Arkansas' self-employed ranks are estimated to experience a net gain of 1,425, an increase of 1.32 percent.

Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are estimated to add more jobs than any other education level with 14,398 jobs between 2022 and 2024. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 10,995.

Arkansas' per capita personal income increased over the 2018-2022 period to \$51,787; however, the state's per capita personal income in 2022 remained below the United States' per capita personal income of \$65,423.

More than a million Arkansas workers earned at least \$12 or more an hour in 2022, with the mean annual wage for all employer sizes estimated at \$48,575. Of the six states surrounding Arkansas, only Mississippi had a lower overall average hourly and average annual wage for all occupations. Of the surrounding states, Texas had the highest average annual wage.

COVID-19

Some of the data in this economic report reflects the impact of COVID-19 while other data sets may not yet reflect the impact. This is especially true when comparing any data from 2018 with data from 2022. It is unknown what the full impact of COVID-19 will be on the data.



State of Arkansas



The state of Arkansas' population grew to 3,045,637 in 2022, increasing 19,746 from 2021 to 2022 and increasing 31,812 from 2018 to 2022. The state of Arkansas consists of 10 Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), six Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), and 75 counties. Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas border the state.


Population Pyramids for Arkansas






The labor force increased by 36,747 between 2021 and 2022, and employment increased by 44,965 over the same period. Unemployment decreased by 8,218 from 2021 to 2022, and has seen a decrease of 4,619 since 2018. The state's unemployment rate declined by 0.7 percent from 2021 to 2022. Over the 2018-2022 period, the unemployment rate declined 0.4 percentage points to 3.3 percent for 2022. The state's unemployment rate was 2.6 percent in July 2023.



Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2023










Arkansas Labor Force and Number of Employed, January 2008 - December 2022

Median Household/Per Capita Personal Income




Arkansas' median household income was \$52,528 in 2022 which increased by \$405 from 2021 to 2022 but is below the national median household income of \$69,717 for 2022. Arkansas' per capita personal income in 2022 was \$51,787 an increase of \$639 from 2021. Over the 2018-2022 period, the per capita personal income increased by \$9,221. The state's per capita personal income is below the United States per capita personal income of \$65,423.

Arkansas/United States Median Household Income 2018-2022



In 2022, whites made up 75.3 percent of the labor force while the total of all minority groups made up 24.7 percent of the labor force. The unemployment rate for all races, including Hispanics, was 3.3 percent. The unemployment rate for all minority groups combined was 4.9 percent. Hispanics of all races made up 8.1 percent of the labor force, with an unemployment rate of 2.9 percent.

Education




All eight education categories are projected to see positive net growth between 2022 and 2024. Occupations requiring no formal education are projected to gain 8,489 jobs during the projection period. Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are expected to gain 14,398 jobs during the projection period and had the highest educational attainment in 2021 at 34.1 percent. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 10,995 jobs and 15.9 percent of the population 25 years and over had a bachelor's degree in 2021. Growth in occupations requiring a master's degree or doctoral or professional degree is expected to be 855 and 733 jobs respectively. Educational attainment of the state's population aged 25 years and over shows that 88.7 percent have earned at least a high school diploma or equivalent, up 0.5 percent from 2020.

Fast Food and Counter Workers was estimated to have the most employees across the state with 36,520 employed in 2022 with an average wage of \$25,579. Cashiers was the second largest occupation with 32,840 employed, earning an average wage of \$25,766. General and Operations Managers had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, averaging \$84,457 annually.

Orthopedic Surgeons, Except Pediatric topped the Occupations
Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$365,576.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$26,393 for 2022. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$38,566, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$59,676 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 1,230,850 estimated employees with hourly wage data, 141,122 made less than \$12 an hour while 300,624 made more than \$27 an hour. Employees making between \$17 and \$21.99 totaled 238,737.









STEM Employment in Arkansas



Industry



Restaurants and Other Eating Places is projected to be the top growing industry in Arkansas, gaining 3,714 new jobs between 2022 and 2024, increasing its overall workforce in the state to 93,472. Electronic Shopping and Mail Order Houses could see a 38.81 percent rise in jobs, becoming the fastest growing industry in the state. Local Government, Excluding Education and Hospitals is estimated to see a difficult outlook between 2022 and 2024, losing an estimated 941 jobs, or 2.38 percent of the workforce, decreasing employment to 38,581. Land Subdivision is slated to be the fastest declining industry, cutting its workforce by 46.25 percent to a level of 43. Trade, Transportation, and Utilities is forecast to be the top growing supersector, anticipated to add 7,186 new jobs during the projection period, an increase of 2.71 percent.

Fast Food and Counter Workers is predicted to be the top growing occupation in the state, adding 1,421 new jobs between 2022 and 2024, bringing its employment to a level of 37,436. **Fundraisers** could see a 31.36 percent rise during the projection period, becoming the fastest growing occupation, raising employment levels to 2,534. **Farmworkers, Farm, Ranch, and Aquacultural Animals** is estimated to be the top declining occupation, losing 211 jobs statewide. **Sailors and Marine Oilers** is slated to be the fastest declining occupation, driving down the industry's small state workforce 15.79 percent. **Business and Financial Operations Occupations** is predicted to be the top growing major group, adding 4,713 new jobs, increasing from 75,003 in 2022 to 79,716 in 2024.



Covered Employment and Earnings



According to the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages Report, Arkansas' covered employment increased by 3.8 percent from 2021 to 2022. This translates to 44,760 jobs gained. Of all the major North American **Industry Classification System (NAICS)** industry supersector groups, all but two gained jobs during the reference period. Trade, Transportation and **Utilities** gained the most at 11,715 jobs. **Information** had the fastest growth, increasing 8.9 percent. Of the two declining industry groups, State Gov**ernment** declined the most, losing 193 jobs. Natural Resources and Mining was the fastest declining industry with a decline of 0.7 percent.

Overall, average weekly earnings in 2022 for the state was \$1,031. The average weekly earnings range from a low of \$416 in **Leisure and Hospitality** to a high of \$1,477 in **Professional and Business Services.**.








The LWDA saw an increase in the labor force of 7,881 to 255,674 from 2021 to 2022, and the labor force increased by 4,541 over the 2018 to 2022 period. Employment increased by 9,495 between 2021 and 2022, and increased by 5,007 over the five-year period. The LWDA has seen an fluctuation in unemployment over the same time periods. From 2021 to 2022, unemployment decreased by 1,614, and from 2018 to 2022, unemployment decreased by 466. The LWDA's unemployment rate dropped by 0.2 percent over the five-year period. In 2023, the unemployment rate dropped by half a percent from January to 2.8 percent in July 2023.

Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2023









Warehousing and Storage is slated to add 715 new jobs between 2022 and 2024, becoming the top growing industry in Central Arkansas, moving employment to 3,548. Nonstore Retailers is projected to raise employment levels 57.14 percent, becoming the fastest growing industry, moving employment to 176. On the negative side of the job market, Private Households could see 223 less employees by first quarter 2024, a 46.36 drop in employment, becoming the top and fastest declining industry. The **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** supersector leads the area, with 1,421 new jobs, moving employment to 42,635.



Local Workforce Development Area Covered Employment and Earnings








Population Pyramids for City of Little Rock





Local Workforce Development Area Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment




The labor force increased in the LWDA by 2,235 from 2021 to 2022, and saw an increase of 126 between 2018 and 2022. Employment increased by 3,725 from 2021 to 2022, and increased by 108 from 2018 to 2022. Unemployment and the unemployment rate decreased between 2021 to 2022, with unemployment decreasing by 1,490 and the unemployment rate decreasing by 1.6 percent to 3.5 percent in 2022. The unemployment rate fluctuated from 2018 to 2022, but ultimately settled at 3.5 percent in 2022, the same rate as 2018. The area unemployment rate fluctuated from January 2023 through July 2023, settling to 3.1 percent in July 2023.





Registered Nurses was estimated to have the most employees in Little Rock with 8,800 employed in 2022 with an average wage of \$72,215. **Retail Salespersons** is the second largest occupation with 6,520 employed, earning an average wage of \$30,935. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 6,490, had the

highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$90,050 annually.







Little Rock Arkansas Number of Employees by Hourly Wage Rate



Insurance Carriers and Related Activities is predicted to be the top growing industry, increasing employment by 1,629 jobs, to a total employment of 18,833. Food Manufacturing is slated to be the fastest growing industry, increasing by 25.68 percent during the 2022-2024 projection period. Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations could see a loss of 540 jobs between 2022 and 2024, becoming the top declining industry in the City of Little Rock WDA, bringing employment down to 10,515. Support Activities for Agriculture and Forestry is predicted to lose a quarter of its workforce to become the fastest declining industry. **Financial Activities** is forecasted to be the top growing supersector, adding 1,671 new jobs between 2022 and 2024, a 6.80 percent rise in employment.



Food Batchmakers could increase by 23.26 percent to a level of 106. On the negative side of the local economy, Fundraisers is slated to be the top and fastest declining occupation in the area, losing 124 jobs, or 20.70 percent of its workforce. **Sales and Related Occupations** is anticipated to be the top growing major group, raising employment by 761 new jobs between 2022 and 2024 to a level of 21,051.






Population Pyramids for Eastern Arkansas








The labor force in the Eastern Arkansas LWDA decreased by 209 to 43,374 in 2022 from 2021, and has decreased by 3,380 from 2018 to 2022. Employment increased from 2021 to 2022, gaining 342 workers to 41,441. Unemployment saw a decrease from 2021 to 2022, having 551 fewer unemployed, enough to change the unemployment rate from 5.7 percent to 4.5 percent. 

Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2023









Eastern Arkansas Number of Employees by Hourly Wage Rate



Food Services and Drinking Places is projected to be the top growing industry, increasing employment by 117 jobs to an employment level of 2,756. Transit and Ground Passenger Transportation is slated to be the fastest growing industry, raising employment levels by 12.00 percent, increasing from 75 jobs in 2022 to 84 jobs in 2024. On the negative side of the job market, Warehousing and Storage could see a drop of 385 jobs, or 65.03 percent of its workforce, becoming the top and fastest declining industry in the Eastern Arkansas WDA. The **Leisure and Hospitality** supersector is estimated to be one of only two growing supersectors, gaining the most at 141 new jobs between first quarter 2022 and first quarter 2024.






Population Pyramids for North Central Arkansas










Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2023





Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is estimated to be the top growing industry in North Central Arkansas, anticipated to add 268 new jobs, a 9.21 percent increase, driving employment to 3,178. Support Activities for Agriculture and Forestry is predicted to be the fastest growing industry, raising employment by 41.35 percent to a level of 564. Animal Production is predicted to cut 171 jobs between first quarter 2022 and first quarter 2024, moving employment down to 591 and becoming the top declining industry. Private Households is anticipated to drop employment by 28.02 percent, becoming the fastest declining industry. **Manufacturing** is estimated to be the top growing supersector, adding 511 jobs between 2022 and 2024, a 5.33 percent rise in employment.

Farmworkers, Farm, Ranch, and Aquacultural Animals is predicted to lose 98 jobs, or 18.99 percent of its workforce to become the top declining occupation. 


Population Pyramids for Northeast Arkansas






The Northeast Arkansas LWDA labor force increased to 123,323 in 2022, or by 2,933 since 2021, and increased over the 2018-2022 period by 1,801. 

Psychiatrists topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$310,988. **Obstetricians and Gynecologists**, with an average annual salary of \$252,669, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$25,987 for 2022. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$38,833, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$54,278 for employers in all size categories.





Nonstore Retailers is set to increase its workforce by 26.83 percent, to become the fastest growing industry in Northeast Arkansas, moving employment from 41 in 2022 to 52 in 2024. Crop Production is projected to lose the most jobs, cutting 149 jobs from its workforce, dropping its employment levels to 1,832. Electrical Equipment, Appliance, and Component Manufacturing could see a drop of 18.64 percent from its workforce, dropping its employment levels to 406. **Education and Health Services** is slated to rise by 936 employees, to become the top growing supersector, moving its employment levels to 29,866.

Fast Food and Counter Workers is projected to be the top growing occupation in Northeast Arkansas between 2022 and 2024, adding 121 jobs, increasing its workforce to 3,452 jobs. Psychiatrists is forecast to be the fastest growing industry, with a 12.94 percent increase. Farmworkers and Laborers, Crop, Nursery, and Greenhouse could see a reduction of 60 jobs, or 7.25 percent of its workforce. Excavating and Loading Machine and Dragline Operators, Surface Mining is estimated to cut 10.34 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation in the area. **Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations** is projected to add 455 new jobs between 2022 and 2024, becoming the top growing major group, and increasing its workforce to 8,794, a 5.46 percent increase.










The Northwest Arkansas LWDA labor force and employment increased from 2021 to 2022, with the labor force gaining 18,938 to 350,997 and employment increasing by 20,020 to 342,190. Unemployment decreased by 1,082 to 9,807 in 2022, and has seen a decrease of 623 since 2018. The unemployment rate dropped from 2021 to 2022 by 0.5 percent to 2.5 percent. The area's unemployment rate fluctuated from 2018, but ultimately settled at 2.5 in 2022. The unemployment rate ended July 2023 at 2.5 percent.



Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2023



Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was estimated to have the most employees in Northwest Arkansas with 10,410 employed in 2022 with an average wage of \$43,348. Fast Food and Counter Workers was the second largest



occupation with 9,510 employed, earning an average wage of \$26,276. **General and Operations Managers**, with an estimated employment of 7,370, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$94,298 annually.

Radiologists topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$347,345. **Ophthalmologists, Except Pediatric**, with an average annual salary of \$271,563, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.


The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$27,073 for 2022. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$38,647, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$64,875 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 296,010 estimated employees in the area with hourly wage data, 82,144 made more than \$27 an hour while 25,537 made less than \$12 an hour. Employees making between \$17 and \$21.99 totaled 58,929.






Northwest Arkansas Number of Employees by Hourly Wage Rate

Religious, Grantmaking, Civic, Professional, and Similar Organizations is slated to add 1,967 jobs between 2022 and 2024, becoming the top growing industry in the Northwest Arkansas WDA, moving employment to 14,428. Nonstore Retailers is predicted to be the fastest growing industry, increasing by 40.26 percent. On the negative side of the economy, Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers is forecast to cut 95 jobs during the 2022-2024 projection period, a 7.37 percent reduction. Lessors of Nonfinancial Intangible Assets (except Copyrighted Works) could see a loss of 19.23 percent. **Professional and Business Services** leads all supersectors in Northwest Arkansas in numeric change, with 2,587 new jobs, a 4.95 percent gain, moving employment from 52,235 in 2022 to 54,822 in 2024.



Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is slated to be the top growing occupation in Northwest Arkansas between 2022 and 2024, increasing its workforce to 14,539. Fundraisers is projected to be the fastest growing occupation, driving up employment 50.28 percent to 819 jobs. On the negative side of the local economy, Tellers is expected to lose 15 jobs, or 1.65 percent of its workforce between 2022 and 2024. Broadcast Announcers and Radio Disc Jockeys could lose 11.43 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation in the area, dropping employment to 31. **Business and Financial Operations Occupations** is predicted to be the top growing major group adding 1,630 new jobs during the projection period to a total employment of 21,934.






Population Pyramids for Southeast Arkansas






Southeast Arkansas saw a decrease in the labor force of 418 to 76,542 from 2021 to 2022, but employment increased by 249 to 72,999 for the same time period. Both the labor force and employment have decreased since 2018 by 4,843 and 4,551 respectively. Unemployment decreased by 667 to 3,543 from 2021 to 2022 and the unemployment rate decreased to 4.6 percent in 2022. After starting at 4.9 percent in January 2023, the unemployment rate fluctuated, ultimately settling to 4.2 percent in July 2023.





Cashiers was estimated to have the most employees in Southeast Arkansas with 1,940 employed in 2022 with an average wage of \$25,113. Fast Food and Counter Workers was the second largest occupation with 1,800 employed, earning an average wage of \$24,974. General and Operations Managers, with an estimated employment of 1,460, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$77,119 annually.

Physicians, All Other topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$249,514. **Dentists, General**, with an average annual salary of \$200,803, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.





Merchant Wholesalers, Nondurable Goods is projected to be the top and fastest growing industry in Southeast Arkansas, increasing its workforce by 175 new jobs, a 17.41 percent gain. On the negative side of the local economy, Paper Manufacturing could lose 266 employees, dropping 10.95 percent of its workforce. Waste Management and Remediation Service is set to be the fastest declining industry, cutting its workforce by 26.51 percent, moving from 83 jobs in 2022 to 61 jobs in 2024. **Leisure and Hospitality** is anticipated to be the top growing supersector, adding 228 jobs between 2022 and 2024, a 4.28 percent rise in employment.






Population Pyramids for Southwest Arkansas




Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The Southwest Arkansas LWDA labor force decreased from 2021 to 2022 by 295 to 88,656, while employment increased by 271 to 84,828. Over the five-year period from 2018 to 2022, the area has seen a decrease of 4,254 in the labor force and decrease of 3,486 in employment. Unemployment decreased by 566 from 2021 to 2022, and decreased by 768 over the five-year period. The unemployment rate dropped by 0.6 percent from 2021 to 2022 to 4.0 percent. After various fluctuations in the unemployment rate during 2023, the rate settled at 4.0 percent in July 2023.



Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2023












Southwest Arkansas Number of Employees by Hourly Wage Rate

Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing is estimated to be the top growing industry in Southwest Arkansas, adding 212 jobs, for an employment level of 2,861. Nonstore Retailers could raise employment levels by 23.44 percent, moving from 64 jobs in 2022 to 79 jobs in 2024. On the negative side of the labor market, Local Government, Excluding Education and Hospitals is slated to lose 182 jobs, dropping employment to 3,185. Private Households is forecast to cut 152 jobs, or 37.07 percent of its workforce, dropping from 410 jobs in 2022 to 258 jobs in 2024, becoming the fastest declining industry in the area. **Leisure and Hospitality** is estimated to be the top growing supersector, with a projected gain of 167 new jobs between 2022 and 2024, a 2.92 percent rise in employment to a level of 5,885.





Fast Food and Counter Workers is projected to be the top growing occupation in Southwest Arkansas between 2022 and 2024, adding 58 jobs, increasing its workforce to 2,271 jobs. Public Relations Specialists could be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 14.77 percent, moving from 176 jobs in 2022 to 202 jobs in 2024. Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 135 being cut, an amount equivalent to 3.19 percent of its workforce. Paper Goods Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders is predicted to lose 19.69 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation in the area. **Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing major group for the 2022-2024 projection period, with 139 new jobs, or 2.50 percent gain, moving employment to 5,553.




Population Pyramids for West Central Arkansas






In 2022, the labor force and employment increased in the West Central Arkansas LWDA. The labor force increased by 2,521 to a total of 129,963, while employment increased 3,153 to a total of 124,933. 


Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2023







Chemical Manufacturing is slated to lose 21.05 percent of the workforce, becoming the fastest declining industry. **Trade, Transportation, and Utilities** is forecast to be the top growing supersector, adding 638 jobs between 2022 and 2024, a 2.90 percent rise in employment.

On the reverse side of the labor market, Clergy is slated to be the top declining occupation, losing 57 jobs, dropping employment to 1,237. 




Population Pyramids for Western Arkansas






The Western Arkansas LWDA labor force increased 1,781 to 109,484 and employment increased by 2,289 to 105,951 from 2021 to 2022. Over the 2018-2022 period, the labor force decreased by 2,990 while employment decreased by 2,405. Unemployment and the unemployment rate both fluctuated from 2018 to 2022. Unemployment ultimately decreased by 585 to 3,533 unemployed, while the unemployment rate dropped by 0.5 percent to 3.2 percent. The area's unemployment rate fluctuated through 2023, ending at 3.6 percent in July.





Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers was estimated to have the most employees in Western Arkansas with 3,290 employed in 2022 with an average wage of \$45,585. Cashiers was the second largest occupation with 2,970 employed, earning an average wage of \$25,249. General and Operations Managers, with an estimated employment of 2,500, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$79,183 annually.

Family Medicine Physicians topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$293,478. **Dentists, General**, with

an average annual salary of \$197,703, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$25,675 for 2022. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$37,645, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$53,827 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 102,580 estimated employees in the area with hourly wage data, 14,894 made less than \$12 an hour while 20,154 made more than \$27 an hour. Employees making between \$17 and \$21.99 an hour totaled 19,096.







Food Manufacturing leads the Western Arkansas WDA region in numeric growth, adding an anticipated 638 new jobs, and moving employment levels to 9,706. Motion Picture and Sound Recording Industries is slated to experience a significant increase due to a new business and recovery from the pandemic, potentially more than doubling in size during the projection period. On the negative side of the labor market, Local Government, Excluding Education and Hospitals is predicted to lose 141 jobs, dropping employment to 2,991, becoming the top declining industry. Publishing Industries (except Internet) is estimated to cut 33.85 percent from its workforce during the projection period, dropping employment below 50. **Manufacturing** is slated to be the top growing supersector, adding 988 jobs between 2022 and 2024, a 4.72 percent rise in employment.

Meat, Poultry, and Fish Cutters and Trimmers is projected to be the top growing occupation in Western Arkansas between 2022 and 2024, adding 179 jobs, increasing its workforce to 2,679 jobs. Labor Relations Specialists is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 26.73 percent, moving from 101 jobs in 2022 to 128 jobs in 2024. Maids and Housekeeping Cleaners could see a decline in employment during the projection period, with 40 being cut, an amount equivalent to 4.88 percent of its workforce. Editors is forecast to cut 18.75 percent of its workforce, dropping its employment to 26. **Production Occupations** is estimated to be the top growing major group for the 2022-2024 projection period, with 537 new jobs, moving employment to 15,076.


