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Introduction

Preface

The Division of Workforce Services (DWS), using data collected by the Occupational Employment and Wage Statistics (OEWS) survey, produces this publication. The DWS would like to thank the employers who took the time to supply the information requested in this survey. Without their cooperation this booklet would not have been possible.

The OEWS survey is a semiannual survey measuring occupational employment and wage rates for salary workers in nonfarm establishments. Most of the agriculture sector is excluded. The survey also does not cover the self-employed, owners and partners in unincorporated firms, household workers, or unpaid family workers. OEWS federal government data include the U.S. Postal Service and the federal executive branch only.

The Arkansas OEWS program samples and contacts establishments in May and November of each year and, over three years, contacts approximately 14,000 establishments. The statewide response rate for the May 2023 panel was 70 percent for establishments, covering 71 percent of employment.

Occupational Coding System

The OEWS survey categorizes workers into approximately 830 detailed occupations based on the 2018 Office of Management and Budget's Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system. Together, these detailed occupations make up 22 of the 23 SOC major occupational groups. Major group 55, Military Specific Occupations, is not included.

Concepts

Occupational employment is the estimate of total wage and salary employment in an occupation. The OEWS survey defines employment as the number of workers who can be classified as full- or part-time employees, including workers on paid vacations or other types of paid leave; workers on unpaid short-term absences; salaried officers, executives, and staff members of incorporated firms; employees temporarily assigned to other units; and employees for whom the reporting unit is their permanent duty station, regardless of whether that unit prepares their paycheck.

Wages for the OEWS survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. Base rate; cost-of-living allowances; guaranteed pay; hazardous-duty pay; incentive pay, including commissions and production bonuses; and tips are included. Excluded are overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, non- production bonuses, employer cost for supplementary benefits, and tuition reimbursements.

The responding establishments are instructed to report hourly rates for part-time workers and to report annual rates for occupations that are typically paid at an annual rate but do not work 2,080 hours per year, such as teachers, pilots, and flight attendants. Other workers, such as some entertainment workers, are paid hourly rates, but generally do not work 40 hours per week, year-round. For these workers, only an hourly wage is reported.

OEWS receives wage rate data for the federal government, the U.S. Postal Service, and most state government, local government, and private sector establishments. For the remaining establishments without wage rate data, the OEWS survey data were placed into 12 wage intervals. The intervals are defined both as hourly rates and the corresponding annual rates, where the annual rate for an occupation is calculated by multiplying the hourly wage rate by a typical work year of 2,080 hours.

Estimation Methodology

The May 2023 estimates were produced by a model-based estimation method using three years of OEWS data (MB3). Under MB3, data provided by survey respondents are used to model occupational staffing patterns and wages for all unobserved establishments in the population, including establishments that were not sampled, sampled establishments that did not respond, and respondents that did not meet stability criteria.



A donor pool typically consisting of 10 nearest neighbor responding establishments is used to predict data for each unobserved establishment; if 10 donors are not available, then as few as 5 can be used. Donors are matched to recipients based on detailed industry, geographic area, ownership, size, and survey panel. Within a given donor pool, donors that are more similar to the unobserved establishment are given more weight in determining the modeled data.

Each establishment's population employment is set as the average of its May 2023 and November 2022 employment from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, the UI database from which the OEWS sample is drawn. Using adjustment factors derived from the OEWS survey data, wages collected in earlier survey panels are adjusted to the reference date of the estimates and donor wages are adjusted for differences between donor and recipient characteristics such as geographic area and industry.

How to Use the Data

The following are some examples of useful applications of occupational employment and wage data:

- Detailed occupational data are used by job seekers or employers to show wages for workers in certain occupations and to assess wage variation within, and across, occupations. Wage variation within an occupation can result from several factors, including industry, geographic location, or a worker's particular experience or qualifications. Useful data for job seekers include information on the industries or geographic areas that have the highest employment or the highest average wages for an occupation. Career and guidance counselors use OEWS data to examine possible occupational choices by field of study or training.
- Human Resources professionals use industry specific occupational data in salary negotiations or to ensure that their wages are competitive with those of other businesses in their area or industry. Information

on the types of jobs within an industry can be used to compare average staffing patterns with that of one's own company. Occupational employment by industry may be useful in assessing the impact of shifts in technology and other macroeconomic trends on the types of jobs available. The state's employment projections programs use this data as an input to their employment projections, to predict training and education demands.

- Geographic area information is used to assess labor market features of a particular area. State level data can be used to make assessments about the diversity of a state's economy or to make comparisons among states. The occupational composition of employment can provide clues to how a state or regional economy can hold up in adverse conditions that affect a certain sector of the economy. Differences in both occupational composition and occupational wage rates also help explain differences in average wages across states. For example, states with high average wages may have larger employment shares of high paying occupations, higher wages within each occupation, or some combination of both factors.
- Like state data, metropolitan area data can be used to study the diversity of local area economies. Businesses can use data to see whether it might be beneficial to relocate to a particular area. Occupational employment data may indicate whether workers are available in occupations that the business will need. For example, businesses that require computer specialists or skilled production workers may want to identify areas that have high employment in these occupations. Businesses may also use the data to compare wages between alternative areas.

Definition of Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs)

In addition to statewide estimates, this publication provides employment and wage estimates for each of the eight Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs) in Arkansas. An MSA is a county or aggregation of counties that have one or more central cities and that meet specified criteria of population, population density, commuting patterns, and social and economic integration. They are defined as follows:





State Analysis

This report uses the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system to classify workers into one of nearly 800 detailed occupations. Together, these detailed occupations make up 22 major occupational groups.

- Arkansas workers earned, on average, \$24.64 per hour in May 2023, according to the latest occupational employment and wage estimates. Statewide, employment is estimated to be 1,271,320.
- Of the occupational groups, Management had the highest hourly mean wage, \$47.14. The workers in this group are managers of various types and levels, including chief executives.
- Food Preparation and Serving-Related Occupations had the lowest hourly mean wage, \$14.01. Jobs in this group include chefs, short order cooks, and waiters/waitresses.
- Office and Administrative Support Occupations made up the highest share of Arkansas jobs; 11.88 percent. These 151,090 jobs paid, on average, \$19.65 per hour.

The average registered nurse earns above the Arkansas mean hourly wage of \$24.64, while the average licensed practical nurse and nursing assistant earns below.

All but one of the STEM occupations listed above pay more than the Arkansas average for all occupations.

These STEM occupations above pay an average of \$39.32 per hour.

[•] The average registered nurse earns 49 percent more than the average licensed practical nurse and 133 percent more than the average nursing assistant.



Employment and Wage Tables

How to Read the Tables

For each occupation in the tables of this publication, the following elements are identified:

Geographic Area. Employment and wage estimates are produced for the state and each of Arkansas' eight Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs).

SOC Code. The Standard Occupation Code (SOC) is a six-digit code designed to define occupations uniformly and to organize occupational data logically. For more information on the SOC, please visit: http://www.bls.gov/soc/home.htm.

Estimated Employment. The employment figure is the estimate of total wage and salary employment in an occupation across the industries in which that occupation was reported. The OEWS survey defines employment as the number of workers who can be classified as full-time or part-time employees, including workers on paid vacations or other types of leave; workers on unpaid short-term absences; salaried officers, executives, and staff members of incorporated firms; employees temporarily assigned to other units; and employees for whom the reporting unit is their permanent duty station regardless of whether that unit prepares their paycheck.

The data in this column is rounded.

Employment (Emp.) RSE. The Relative Standard Error (RSE) is a measure of the reliability of a survey statistic, in this case the employment estimate. The smaller the relative standard error, the more precise the estimate.

Entry Wage. The entry wage is defined as the mean (average) of the first third of the wage distribution within each of the occupations.

Mean (average) Wage. The mean wage is the total wages that all workers in the occupation earn divided by the total employment of the occupation.

Median Wage. The median wage is the wage where 50 percent of all workers earn that amount or less and where 50 percent of all workers earn that amount or more.

Experienced (Exp.) Wage. The experienced wage is defined as the mean (average) of the upper two-thirds of the wage distribution within each of the occupations.

N/A - Indicates that the data is not available because of confidentiality or lack of data.

Entry/Experienced Wages: The OEWS survey does not collect information on whether workers are entry level or experienced; work experience or tenure; or any other information about job levels or rank. Therefore, these estimates are not a product of the OEWS program or the BLS Federal/State cooperative effort.

Mean Wage RSE. The Relative Standard Error (RSE) is a measure of the reliability of a survey statistic, in this case the mean wage estimate. The smaller the relative standard error, the more precise the estimate.
